School Board Meets

A meeting of the school board was held in the city clerk's office on Tuesday, the 17th inst., all the members being present. The chairman, Mr. Brotherton, read the report of the committee appointed to deal with the rearrangement of work in the schools, necessitated by the over-crowding now prevalent.

There were three suggestions for dealing with the problem. The first was to rearrange the standards and leave the present teaching staff to cope with the situation. The objection to this was that there would be no accommodation for more pupils, and reconstruction would certainly have to be undergone at Easter.

Mr. Pentland had suggested an ungraded school as a temporary relief, but this was not considered a satisfactory arrangement. The second suggestion placed before the board was to move Standard V. to Mont-ross Street school. This would put the Toronto Street school in good shape, but make reorganization at Easter necessary at Montreal Street.

The third suggestion was that the Standard V. pupils who lived across the track should be placed in a separate room at the Montreal Street school. This arrangement would suffice for the term, which ends on June 30 next, and was strongly recommended by Mr. Gray, who was present at the meeting. A new teacher would have to be appointed.

After a short discussion it was decided to adopt the third plan. The question of the engagement of Mr. Ware on Mr. Pentland's return was next brought up. Mr. Ware is at present substituting for Mr. Pentland and came here from Edmonton at his request. It was decided to engage Mr. Ware on special terms as the circumstances of his appointment were exceptional.

With regard to the new teacher who will be required, the chairman read a number of applications for the position. A motion to have the blackboards at the Montreal Street school treated with a blackening solution, was carried. These, it was stated, were in a bad condition, and the reflection from them was dazzling the eyes of the pupils, making the matter written on them difficult to read.

The chairman then read Inspector Brown's report in which the educational work in the local schools was very highly eulogized. In Medicine Hat, he said, were nine teachers, who were among the best in the province. Mr. Brotherton went on to say that with increased accommodation, it was hoped that in the near future, extension work along matriculation and commercial lines would be carried out.

Mr. Niblock brought the teaching of languages should be taken up. He instanced a case which had come under his notice of a boy who had been taking the high school course in German. Since coming to live in Medicine Hat he had been unable to follow up his studies, and particularly was handicapped by the lack of opportunity to go on with his language. The speaker thought this was an urgent matter, as it behooved the city to supply the best educational facilities possible.

Mr. Gray also spoke strongly on this question. The chairman thought the time had not yet arrived for the board to take action, but expressed himself in favor of the introduction of these high school subjects when the present difficulties had been overcome.

Mr. Gray stated that the introduction of language teaching at the present juncture would make the situation a much more difficult one to deal with. Already the school accommodation was taxed to the utmost. The matter of selling school seats was next brought up. Mr. Kennedy stated that in the past the record of seats sold had been kept. On Mr. Milne's motion it was decided to get a report from the janitor when the new arrangement came into force, when it could be seen how many of the seats it would be advisable to dispose of.

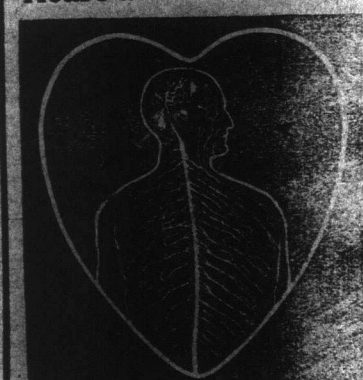
A lot of new settlers have located here this fall, and lots more are coming next spring. Most of them are from N. Dakota.
