Is chairman of the Board of Harbor Commissioners, Quebec; vice-president of the Quebec Notre Dame Savings Bank; a director of the North Shore Railway, of the DeLery Gold Mining Co., and of the Quebec Permanent Building Society. Has been vice-president of the Board of Trade of Quebec. Sat as a mem. for Quebec in L. A., Can., from 1857 until 1860, when unseated on petition; and for present seat from latter year until g. e., 1863, when defeated. Was an unsuccessful candidate for Quebec in 1854. Elected by acclamation at last g. e. to Commons and Local Legislature. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir G. E. Cartier.—*Quebec.*

SIMPSON, WEMYSS MCKENZIE, J.P. [*Algoma.*]

S. of Geddes McKenzie Simpson, Esq., of London, Eng.; was cousin to the late Sir George Simpson, Kt., in his lifetime Governor of the Hudson Bay Co. B. in London, Eng., 1824. Ed. there. M., 1853, Annie, dau. of Capt. Ironside, of the Indian Department, Can. Was in the service of the Hudson Bay Co. for a period of twenty-four years, during eight of which he held the position of Chief Factor. Acted as Guide and Interpreter to the Red River Expeditionary Force, 1870. First returned to Parlt. at last g. e. for present seat. A Conservative, and a supporter of Sir J. A.
