Education has given building proposal approval for construction the \$1.3 million St. Jerome school, just east of Huron Park

Tenders will be awarded by the Dufferin-Peel separate school board in August. Construction is expected to start in October.

The separate board has concluded a purchase agreement with the developer who owns the land. The site was proposed for a senior public school by the Peel Board of Education, but that board decided last week to release its option because the school is not

The separate board had hoped to have the public board transfer its option. so that the site could have been purchased for a reduced amount However, the Peel board refused. saying developers would be reluctant to make purchase agreements in future if they thought they could be transferred. As a result the separate

than we expected to" for the site, says superintendent of business affairs Ed LeMay. As well, the cost of acquiring the land has been allocated in the 1981 capital budget by Ontario. The separate board may have to lease the land until the end of the year to start construction in 1980

The construction of Archbishop Pocock secondary school is also expected to begin in October. Tenders have been awarded by the board for the \$2.5 million project.

The separate board is opening six new schools in September, but none will be in regular buildings. The St. Jerome students will be bused to Applewood until their school is completed.

At the former Gulleden Public School, two separate schools will operate. One of them, St. Sofia, is for the Ukrainian Catholic church. The other, St. David, will house students from the new Creditview community north of Burnhamthorpe Road

shopping centre.

The new St. Luke school, for children along Lakeshore Road east of Lorne Park Road, will be

housed in portables at St. Christopher on Clarkson Road.

Students of St. Mark school in Erin Mills will be in portables at St. former Runningbrook Public School is to be the home of a new separate school called Mother Teresa.
