promptly to Head-quarters with a covering letter and a statement of the amount of money received, the amount paid out and the balance, if any, refunded.

The Department desires you to furnish explanation regarding payments made in 1913 to the under-mentioned persons, which information you were unable to give previously as your clerk omitted entering the same in the pay-lists.

No. 73. Osnaburg Band. The pay-lists show that you paid \$16.00 arrears for 1910 to this family. The 1910 pay-list shows that this man was paid at time of distribution. \$16.00 will have to be retained unless there are satisfactory reasons to the contrary submitted.

No. 74 Osnaburg Band. In 1911 seven persons were paid under this number, but only 6 shares were paid in 1912; one girl having married a non-treaty Indian. This girl should be given a new number of her own in the pay-list and allowed arrears for 1912.

No. 83 Osnaburg Band. 6 shares were paid in 1911, but only 5 shares were paid in 1912. Kindly explain full the cause of the decrease.

No. 188 Fort Hope Band. This family should not have been admitted into Treaty until their application for admission was submitted to the Department for approval. Should any families apply to you for admission to Treaty, you should enter them in the pay-list, but obtain in each case the reason for asking for admission to Treaty and submit the matter to the Department for consideration, when you will be advised of the result.

No. 24 Moose Factory Band. The man who is married should be given a new number in the pay-list and should
