TO END WAR FOR YEARS

Slaughter in Near Fight Will Startle Civilized World.

Admiral Beresford, R. N., Predicts Japanese Victory in the Coming Sea Fight Because of Better Gunnery—France Continues to Show Her Good Faith in the Matter of Neutrality.

New York, May 11.—"The Russian and Japanese fleets will meet in a few days. Japan will win. The slaughter of men in that battle will be so great as to startle the civilized world. The only redeeming feature of the fight will be the fact that there will be no more wars for years. The horrors will be too great."

Vice-Admiral Lord Charles Beresford of the British navy made this statement yesterday just before his departure for Liverpool. His opinion is founded on the fact that the Japs are the better gunners.

The Russian Fleets.
St. Petersburg, May 11.—The Admiralty does not confirm the London report that the Russian cruiser Almaz of Admiral Rojestvensky's squadron has reached Vladivostok. Beyond saying that Rojestvensky and Nebogomirsky have effected a junction, the Admiralty says it is without news of the Russian squadron.

Did They Elude Togo?
London, May 11.—A despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Co. from St. Petersburg, says it is reported there that the Russian cruisers Almaz and Fenchuk, belonging to Rear Admiral Rojestvensky's division, have eluded the Japanese warships and reached Vladivostok.

Told to Go and Went.
Saigon, May 11.—The Russian cruiser Jemchug and the Russian auxiliary cruiser Blon, belonging to Admiral Rojestvensky's squadron, arriving at Cape St. James, near here, during the night of May 8 and left Tuesday morning at the request of the Governor of French Indo-China.

Arrested as Spies.
Tokyo, May 11.—M. A. E. Bougain, a prominent French man, and his stepson, F. Strange, an Englishman, have been arrested here as spies.

BOMBS, DYNAMITE, TORCH.

Russian Laboring Classes Are Threatening to Use Them.

Reval, European Russia, May 11.—At a large meeting of workmen here yesterday, which was attended by delegates from St. Petersburg and a number of masked men, it was decided to proclaim a three days strike in connection with Labor Day (May 14), fresh demands in the employers, coupled with the intention that if they were not complied with inside of 12 hours the destruction of the factories by fire would follow.

Bombs For Troops.
St. Petersburg, May 11.—The Social Democrat declares that their program includes demonstrations throughout Russia on Sunday, and that they are provided with bombs and dynamite with which to fight the troops if the latter interfere.

Kloft, Russia, May 11.—A general strike and extensive demonstration are expected here on the Russian May Day.

Sixteen Were Killed.
St. Petersburg, May 11.—According to private advice from Schlimm, the fruits of the anti-Jewish riot, there are 16 dead and over 100 wounded, mostly Jews. Martial law was proclaimed at Schlimm yesterday. The city is filled with troops.

S. A. IMMIGRANTS ARRIVE.

Every Man and Girl In Ship Provided With a Position.

Quebec, May 11.—Three thousand four hundred new settlers were landed at this port yesterday morning. The Vancouver, with the Salvation Army immigrants, steamed up the harbor at 10 o'clock. The local contingent of the Army, under Staff-Captain Patterson and Ensign Hannah, were on the deck to greet Col. Jacobs and other officers of the Salvation Army in charge of the new arrivals. Eight hundred of the number who came out as steerage were landed at Quebec. There were 140 uniformed members of the Army with the aggregation, which is, without exception, the finest looking lot of settlers who ever arrived here. They come from all parts of England, Scotland and Ireland, especially from the vicinity of Cork.

Col. Jacobs, general secretary of the Salvation Army in Canada, with headquarters at Toronto, said that every man and girl on the ship was already provided with a position, to which he or she would go direct. He added that there were many men of means in the number, who had been in business in Britain, and the greater part of those would proceed to the Northwest Territories to invest their capital.

Confesses to Murder.
Vancouver, May 11.—A man giving the name of John Jackson walked in to the city police station early yesterday morning and asked to be placed under arrest, said he had committed a murder in London, England. He wrote out a statement to the effect that on the night of December 29, 1903, he had murdered a Polish Jewess while under the influence of liquor. He said he had only been out from England a month, but could bear the secret no longer. The man was evidently under the influence of opium, and the police are uncertain whether the confession is genuine. He says he was a solicitor's clerk in London.

His counsel appealed on the point as to whether the comment of the crown prosecutor with regard to prisoner not giving evidence, was proper, a new trial being set for June or July.

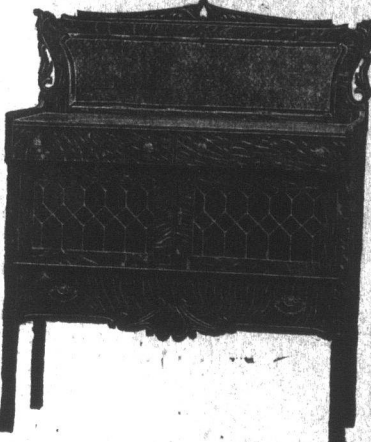
