The Work to be done in Massachusetts.

A Correspondent of the N. Y. Christian Advocate and Journal, says:—

If we enact the Maine law in Massachusetts, we have work to perform. The people must be aroused, and the public mind impressed with the utility and necessity of such legislation, or it will not be worth a straw if we obtain it. But I entertain strong hopes of success. It can be done if we will it, and it can be done better at the next session of the legislature than ever after. "There is a tide in the affairs of men, which taken at the flood, leads on to fortune." At any rate a strong effort by the friends of temperance to obtain such a law here, would draw the resources of the liquor-dealers of Boston from the furious warfare now waging against the law of Maine, to the work of self-defence.— Unless I mistake the signs of the times, the rum-sellers will need all the sinews of war at their command to defend their saloons and groggeries from a disaster, similar to the one which has overtaken the groggeries of Maine. It is a notorious fact that the fiercest hostility to the cause in Maine originated in Boston among the heartless rum-sellers. Every friend of humanity and religion in the State should be on the alert. Talk, write, preach, and pray for the overthrow of this monstrous traffic, and for the enactment of a law that shall stay the proud waves of desolation that are now sweeping into the grave and perdition, the dearest interests of God and man. Let those who can labour with ability and success rush into the breach. Father Taylor, the old man eloquent, should let his startling, soul-stirring appeals again be heard, amidst the contending waves of passion and interest.—Cummins, the rising sun of our northern clime, should dissipate the fog and mist with which this question is surrounded, by the scintillations of his brilliant intellect.—Traffon with his wit, fun and logic, should carry the war into the enemy's camp, and storm the castle—and Stevens, with his pen of light and tongue of fire, should enlighten the understanding, awaken the slumbering energies of the soul, and lead on the sacramental host of God's elect to glorious victory.

A Washington despatch says, that Mr Webster, Secretary of State, has rejected the proposition of the Spanish Government made through its Minister here, for the settlement of the late difficulties about Cuba, and for a better understanding between the two countries. The proposition was for the American Government to invite the Spanish Consul to return to New Orleans, to bring him in a national vessel, and to salute the Spanish flag over him, and further to restore the value of the property of the Consul, and of the Spanish citizens of New Orleans, which was destroyed by the rioters.

In case this proposition should be rejected, the Minister was instructed to demand his passports and return.

The latest accounts from Buenos Ayres represent the position of Oribe and his army as desperate.
