the practice which has too long prevailed, of including in the same Bill of Supply, matters which have not been recommended, with those which have—and things also entirely of a different nature, thereby precluding me from that separate consideration of those matters, which, as a distinct Branch of the Legislature, I ought to possess. I had indulged a hope, that your attention would have been so given to these objects, as to relieve me from my present embarrassment.

"No claim can be more justly founded, that that of a right in each of the three Branches of the Legislature, to a distinct and separate consideration of all matters previously to their passing into a Law. The adherence to which

principle is necessary to the preservation of our Constitution.

frequently allowed to pass without correction, until productive of serious mischief. And I must press upon your attention, the expediency of eradicating as early as possible, the few remaining errors in our Legislative system—they will easily be discovered, by a comparison with the Parliamentary forms and usages of the Mother Country; and a close adherence to the Governor's commission and instruction, which together with such Laws as have been ratified from time to time, form the Constitution of the Colony.

"Feeling confident that at a future Session, this subject will be reconsidered with that attention which its importance demands: Aware also how much inconvenience would be felt by the loss of the Appropriation Bill, I am induced by such considerations, as well as the ardent desire I possess of promoting the welfare and happiness of this flourishing Province, to yield my assent to the

present Bill, although it has not my unqualified approbation.

"At the same time, candour obliges me to inform you, that I should not have felt justified in doing this, without a determination to avail my self of the control I possess, of suspending the issue of warrants for such services, as I cannot approve, until otherwise instructed.

" Gentlemen of the Council,

" and Gentlemen of the Assembly,

"Your assiduous attention to the public business throughout a long Ses-

sion, demands my thanks.

"The provisions of many of the Acts which have been passed, are important, and will, I trust, be productive of very beneficial consequences."

And that the Honourable Mr. Justice Saunders, then said,

" Gentlemen of the Council,

" and Gentlemen of the Assembly,

"It is His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor's will and pleasure, that this General Assembly be prorogued to the first Wednesday in June next, and this General Assembly is accordingly prorogued to the first Wednesday in June next."
