CONVICTION NOW GROWING OF THE VICTORIOUS END

Paris Aug. 12.—Albert Thomas, under secretary of war in charge of munitions, tells The Petit Parisien that France's efforts to produce munitions are different in method, but equal in results to those of England, which he recently viewed. The newspaper quotes him as follows: "We have an army which at the present is armed so as to withstand any shock, an army which on the other hand is capable of making a strong offensive. Its morale is good—that is to say the army is prepared to remain as it is if necessary. "Every day our strength grows both in England and in France. Notwithstanding the formidable resources at the disposal of Germany, it is not possible that the resources will not assure them when the time is ripe for complete victory. What we have, what England has and will have, all the resources that she can create, will assure us supremacy. I am convinced of this because I know. Every day I repeat to my friends my conviction that we shall be victorious."

RAILROAD SMASH IN UNITED STATES; MANY DEATHS

Knights of Pythias Excursion in Ohio in Fatal Accident. Columbus, O., Aug. 12.—Five killed and 16 injured about 5 o'clock this morning when an excursion train was in a rear end collision with a freight train at Orient, a station on the Baltimore and Ohio Southwestern Railroad, 14 miles south of this city. The dead and injured were the members of a party of Knights of Pythias lodge excursion from Mount Sterling, Ohio, who were returning from their annual outing at Cedar Point, a summer resort on Lake Erie near Sandusky. The passenger train had stopped to take water, and the freight train crashed into it from the rear. The injured are being brought to Columbus hospital.

YANKS FEELING WAY; CANADA AS AN ALLY

New York, Aug. 12.—The New York Evening Mail says editorially: "The United States and the South American Governments are co-operating toward a solution of the Mexican problem. This diplomatic effort to arrive at a result desired by all already aroused the thought of united effort by the United States and the South American governments for broader purposes on questions that may arise in the future mark in the Canadian part of the Americas. Its interests in Mexico are very great. Canadian capital participated in the development of Mexican natural resources. The stability and democracy of their government are well worthy of broader influence in shaping the destinies of the Americas. "It is to be hoped that an opportunity will be found to bring Canada to join in the conference now in progress at Washington. Canada has the same outlook upon the Pacific as the United States. The time may come when both nations may find it indispensable to stand side by side in the defence of common interests. Now is the time to lay the foundation for a closer co-operation in the future."
