Turks Announce That is What Happened to Allies Yesterday.

CRUISER HIT

Special Wire to the Courier. Constantinople, Dec. 3—The Turkish war office announced to-day that in the fighting at the Dardanelles a cruiser of the allies had been hit three times and forced to retire. An allied torpedo boat was attacked by a Turkish aeroplane after it had stranded on the coast of the Bay of Saros. The statement follows: "At some points on the Dardanel

les front there has been fierce fighting with bombs. Two hostile cruisers near Anafarta, and two near Ari Burnu participated with land batter. ies in a bombardment. Our artillery replied, damaging trenches of the enemy and destroying machine gun positions at Ari Burnu.

"Our artillery thrice hit a hostile cruiser near Seddul Bahr, compelling it to retreat. One of our aeroplanes dropped bombs on a torpedo boat of the enemy which had stranded on the northern coast of the Gulf of Saros, wo miles west of Cape Eridsche.
