PROHIBITION FOR QUEBEC NEXT YEAR

Liberal Caucus Favors Abelition of All Licen

QUEBEC, Jan. 22—Quebec is to have absolule, complete prohibition starting May 1st, 1919. This was decided at the Liberal caucus held this morning at the Parliament Buildings. The cancus lasted barely one hour. Nothing was discovered outside of the prohibition question. The sentiment appears to have been practically generally favorable to absolute prohibition. If it be true that the Bolshevik gov If it be true that the Bolshevik government intends to publish a decree repudating all Russian loans and treasury bonds held by foreign subjects abroad or in the country, the decision is one of the most disastrous to Russia that could possibly be conceived. Add to this the repudiating of all national debt held by Russian citizens possessing more than 16,000 rubles in capital and the ruin of the country would be complete.
