London, May 15,-In a statement in the House of Commons to-day regarding the measures proposed by the government for the relief of the sufferers from the volcanic outbreaks in the West Indies, the government leader, A. J. Balfour, after a reference to the steps taken, added-

"We have not failed to take account of the most sympathetic manner in which the United States Government have, to use their own language, expressed their desire 'to share in the work of aid and rescue.' As to the manner in which this generous offer can best be accepted, the government of the Windward Isles has already been consulted.

Mr. Balfour referred to the opening of the relief fund at the Mansion house, by the Lord Mayor, Sir Joseph Dimsdale, in behalf of the sufferers of Canada, Jamaica, and other West Indian Islands and the Islands of Maurtius (in the Indian Ocean) had promis-ised to help with money and goods.
