What we did say was that the whole press should not be denounced on account of the alleged errors of a few newspapers. We presume that Mr. MacGillivray would be among the first to take exception if The Planet came out with the statement that the ministry was "unreliable," "inaccurate," and "misleading" because certain members of that body have gone astray. He would be perfectly within his right; but he has no more right to defend the ministry than The Planet has to defend the press.—Ed. Planet.

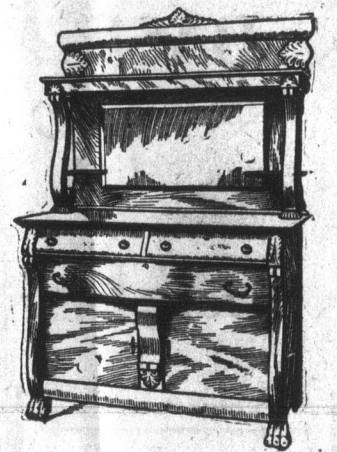

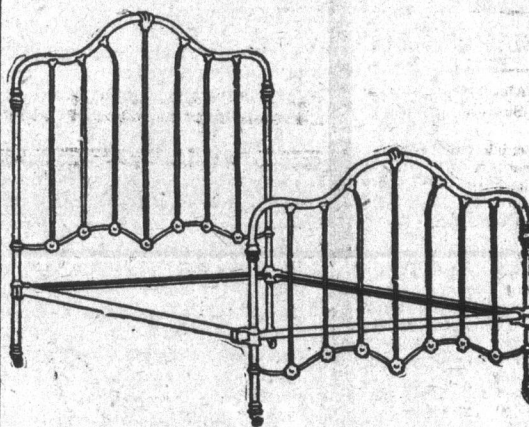

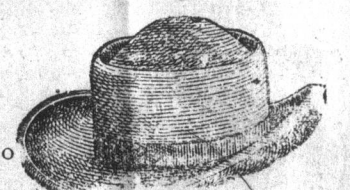
