Settled by Scores in Detroit Divorce Courts-Some Startling Facts.

Much Soiled Linen Lugged ove from Windsor Because Mar-riages are Not Made Public.

Detroit, Feb. 16.—Four new divorce cases were started in the Wayne circuit court yesterday, and in two of these—Ida Mae Miner vs. Fred S. Miner and Charlotte Nichols vs. William J. Nichols—the marriage was solemized in Windsor, Ont.

Mrs. Miner finds herself an applicant for divorce honors before she has been wedded a year. The marriage, according to her bill, occurred March 2, 1903, by the Rev. Edward Bovington. She alleges that Frederick Miner has repeatedly threatened her life and as recently as yesterday, she charges he assaulted her. The separation and her application for divorce followed at once.

Alleged cruelty is also the basis of Mrs. Nichols bill. She charges that on Feb. 9 Nichols assaulted her so vjoiently that she has been under the care of a physician ever since. They were married in Windsor in July 1889.

Among the more conspicuous of the Windsor marriages which terminated in the diyorce courts of Wayne county in 1903 was that of James F. Heintzman and Louisa Betsinger, both of Ecorse. Rev. Mr. Hind, of Sandwich, Ont., started them on their voyage of matrimonial squabbles in 1902. The mother of Heintzman appeared beford Judge Donovan and asked to have the marriage annulled on the ground that her son was not competent at that time to enter into a marriage contiract. Rev. Mr. Hind was a witness in the case. He said he noticed nothing wrong with the groom except that he looked him straight in the eye.

When Heintzman obtained his license to wed, he refused to give his mother's name and the space was left blank. Rrv. Mr. Hind said that he had noticed that violation of the law, but such things were ordinary occurrences. He often marriad couples who refused to fill out certain requirements of the license as the law distinctly provides.

The judge was quite shocked when informed by Rev. Mr. Hind that he performed in the course of a year 200 or more marriages and expressed a tart opinion. Rev. Mr. Hind said said that he was entirely, within the law in the matter.

One day last summer Judge Frazer heard four cases. All had entered into the state of wedded bliss in Windsor. Judge Rohnert in one day heard four cases. Three of them were Windsor marriages. WINDSOR MAGISTRATE ROASTS ONTARIO LAWS

"We have an example before us of the fault of our law," said Magistrate Bartlet, in referring to the case of Joseph Cedar, convicted of bigamy. This poor fellow was lured on to commit the crime of taking a second wife, partly through ignorance and partly because he believed his second marriage would not be found out.

"We have many such cases and I believe it is because of the fact that marriages can more easily be suppressed in Windsor that couples come from Michigan to be married here.

"I believe the press, and whoever wishes, should be privileged to keep in touch with all the marriages performed by the clergy. The right kind of marriage is honorable, and those who try to conceal such are leaving themselves open to suspicion

those who try to conceal such are leaving themselves open to suspicion and gossip. While there is probably not always dishonor connected with such it is true that society should be protected at least. How can this be if people are not allowed to know which of their associates are wedded and which not?

"I think the law could be improved much in respect to compelling marriages performed in Ontario to be immediately made public. While I have no sympathy with the divorce courts of Detroit, where such ruthless annulments of life-long pledged yows are made, still I believe that possibly our own law is somewhat to blame. If marriages in Ontario were always open, as I am led to believe marriages on the other side of the river are, it would prevent many youtful conon the other side of the river are, it would prevent many youthful contracts. Often parents object, but how can they prevent matters when there is such a close haven for them to flee to and afterwards have their escapade suppressed. Yes, I think a decided improvement could be effected, and I would be only too glad to see some step taken in that respect.

WAYNE RECORD TELL SOME SAD

Out of the 724 divorces commenced in the Wayne county circuit court during the year 1903 nearly one-seventh of those who had centracted those unfortunate alliances were married in Windsor, Ont., or some other part of Essex county. Of these 724 cases, 30 were withdrawn or otherwise disposed of and the rest were still pending on Jan 1, of this year. When the fact i srecalled that Wayne county, including Detroit, has a population that proportions at least 25 to 1, when compared with Essex county, the Ontario contribution to the year's business is better appreciated.

A glance merely at the divorce records at the county building brings forcibly to mind the fact that the great majority of the manninges contracted across the Detroit river hear very recent dates. One knot in particular, that of James H. Guest vs. Emma Guest, was tied Nov. 13, 1903. The bill for divorce was filed Nov. 18, just five days afterwards. However, this case was discontinued. Of these 102 mis-mated couples, eight were married in Essex county during 1903; 15 were married in 1902; nine in 1901; and 16 in 1900. This inindicates that nearly one-half of them not only married in haste, but also made great haste to repent.

Those eloquent records show something not very creditable to Americans or Canadians, in that 68 of the 102 Essex county misalliances were contracted by people whose names are purely English. The balance is divided among the German, French, Irish, Scotch, Jewish and the Slavic races. All kinds of grounds for divorce are alleged in the complaints filed, but they are not of much value for statistical purposes because it too often happens that the true reason for the divorce is not given at all. For instance the majority of complaints allege extreme cruelty, which is sometimes only another way of saying that the defendant was not true to his marriage vows. However, the great times only another way of, asying that the defendant was not true to his marriage vows. However, the great number of allegations of desertion that are found point to a samificant fact that needs no comment. They lead to the natural conclusion that some of them are nothing more or less than cases of seduction, for it appears on the surface at least, that the man simply married the girl relying on the fact that the marriage would not be published through the proper channels and then deserted his wife within a very short time.

STUDY OF THE RECORDS.

One fact forces itself to the mind of any one who studies the records and that is that little children always, or all least almost always, acts as a deterrent to this pernicious divorce habit, and must have been a great reconciling force in many a family jar.

Of these mis-mated Essex county couples one of them has four children, three of them, three children, five have two children, 27 have one child and 66 have no children at all.

Of these 102 bills for divorce 48 have aiready been granted, 53 are still pending, and six have been discontinued. In this connection it must be borne in mist that so far not a single application for the severing of the marriage tie has been refused, and that in all cases three months must elapse before a divorce is granted. So it may be safely predicted that nearly all of the cases pending will be cided in favor of one of the litigants. The plaintiffs in 73 of the cases are the wives, or nearly three-fourths of the whole number.
