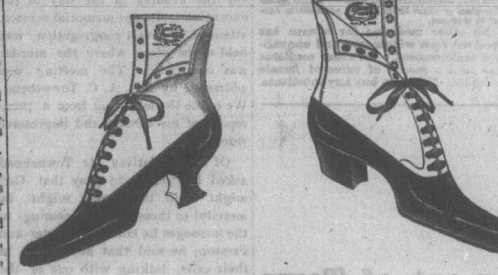

Ernest Peacock, one of the best known newspaper men and politicians in Canada, died in Quebec on the 19th, aged 54 years. Mr Peacock was prominently identified with the late Mr Mercier during his official reign as Premier of Quebec, and was, with him, tried at Quebec in 1892 on certain charges of conspiracy, and acquitted.

'The Divine Foundation of the Lord's Day,' the subject of an Address of the Rev. William Caven, D. D., L. L. D., Principal of Knox College, delivered at the Convention of the Ontario Lord's Day Alliance, Toronto, is published in full in The Lord's Day Advocate for April. It is a powerful and simply unanswerable argument for Sunday observance.

The addition to our School for the Blind, in Halifax, was opened on the 19th, in the presence of 1,000 people. This institution, for the educating and training of the blind of the Maritime Provinces and Newfoundland, under the superintendence of efficient Dr. C. F. Fraser, has no superior on this continent. The work of Dr. Fraser is grand and noble beyond all criticism.

Rev. William Dobson has left Windsor, on route to Los Angeles, California, where he will be representative of the Nova Scotia Conference at American Methodist Quadrennial Conference which meets in that city. He will be absent about two months, and during that time the pulpit at Windsor will be supplied by Rev. Mr. Hocking, son of Rev. Mr. Hocking, of Amherst. He is coming to Windsor from Boston, where he has been taking a post graduate course.

A number of newspapers in Ontario stated that Alex. Mills, Attorney for the Ontario Lord's Day Alliance, deceived the Railway Committee of the Legislature, by presenting petitions from the people signed years ago for another purpose. Mr Mills' threatened action for libel against these papers. The Hamilton Spectator immediately published a full and unqualified retraction and apology. Other newspapers followed in a similar course. The Windsor Standard, that started the asserted libel, has now to defend itself in the law courts.

Professor Ian Campbell Hannah, the newly elected president of Kings College, Windsor, comes to the university with a fine reputation as a scholar. He is not quite thirty years of age, as he was born in December, 1874. Mr Hannah is the eldest son of the dean of Chichester. He was educated at Winchester, whence he went to Trinity College, Cambridge, in 1892. In 1895 he took his bachelor's degree with theological honors. In 1897 and for the next two years he was master of the English schools for Europeans in Tien Tsin, China. He is now Cambridge University extension lecturer. He is a student of the Inner Temple, London, and could soon become a qualified barrister.

The new lecturer in mathematics and physics at Kings is W. H. Salmon, B. A., Cambridge, with honors in mathematics and physics. He is now a lecturer in the Central Technical College, London.

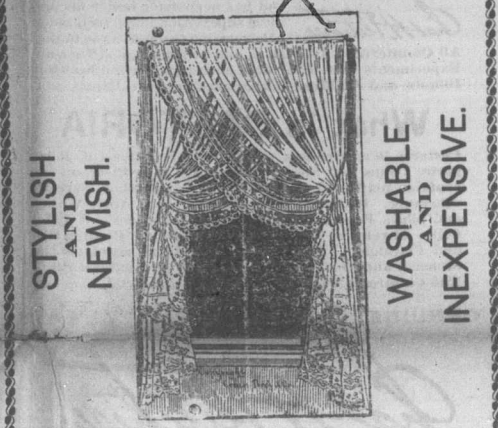
