

## AN ACTION FOR \$56,000.

Plaintiff Claims That Inefficiency of Fire Service at St. John's, Quebec,

Was Responsible for the Loss of His Factory There Some Time Ago.

INSTIGATED TO ACTION BY INSURANCE COMPANIES.

MONTREAL, April 9.—Action is now being heard in the supreme court for \$56,000 against the city of St. John's, Que., in which J. E. Wollour is plaintiff. He alleges that the inefficiency of the fire brigade and insufficiency of the water supply were responsible for the loss of his factory, while the city has called the water works in warranty. Wollour has taken this action at the request of the insurance companies, who claim that the city and not them should bear the loss.

City Council to Reinststate Engineer Hunter on Works

Drunken Man Bit Thumb from Invalid Brother

Hugh Linden Sent Up for Trial—Immigrants Delayed.

ST. JOHN, April 9.—At a meeting of the Common Council this forenoon it was decided to ask Engineer Hunter to come back from Boston and resume work. His pay had been stopped by Superintendent Murdoch for the time he was absent on his holidays and he got mad and left. The Council will give him full pay for all the time he has been absent.

Frank Moore was arrested on Saturday for assaulting his brother Stanley, who is an invalid. Moore went home drunk and seizing Stanley by the throat handled him roughly, finishing the assault by biting off Stanley's thumb. He was today remanded for sentence.

Hugh Linden was sent up for trial to the County Court on the charge of obtaining goods under false pretenses. Ledger keeper Kenny of the Royal Bank testified that certain sums had on March 31st and April 2nd been deposited in Linden's name in the Bank by other parties.

Owing to a shortage of cars some fourteen hundred immigrants who reached here Saturday on the steamer Montreal were delayed and will only get away this afternoon.

### BURNED TO DEATH.

Aged Quebec Lady Unable to Escape from Her Home, Which Was Destroyed.

THREE RIVERS, Que., April 9.—An aged lady, Mrs. Massicotte, was burned to death in a fire which destroyed her home late yesterday afternoon. The neighbors saw the flames and entering found the woman in bed dead and partly consumed by the flames.

### DIED OF APOPLEXY.

Duncan N. McIntyre Stricken at King Edward Hotel, Toronto, Last Night.

TORONTO, April 9.—Duncan N. McIntyre, a local agent of the Fur Coat Manufacturing Co., Ltd. of Detroit and Windsor, was stricken with apoplexy last night at the King Edward Hotel and died at Emergency Hospital. He was 55 years of age.

### STOCKS DULL.

The Ticker Almost Devoid of Transactions Today.

Mexican Power Among the Leaders at 63 3/8.

Dominion Iron, Detroit United, Mackay and Havana.

MONTREAL, April 9.—Dealings in the stock market fell off to a marked extent today, and the ticker was almost devoid of transactions. The only business of note was in Mexican Power, at 63 3/8; Dominion Iron, 33 1/2; Detroit, 92; Mackay, 62; Havana at 58.

Louis Bell Disappeared From Peterboro in December Last.

PETERBORO, Ont., April 9.—The body of Louis Bell, the twelve year old son of Alex. Bell, was found in the Trent Canal yesterday, near his parents' residence. The boy disappeared in December last and it was rumored that he had gone to New York.

### MYSTERIOUS JOAN McCANN.

She is the Real Thing—Holds 530 Shares

Of Toronto Life Insurance Company's Stock.

At Present Nursing a Patient at Holland House, New York.

TORONTO, April 9.—The mysterious Miss Joan McCann, who is reported to hold 530 shares of Toronto Life Insurance stock, and whom some people believed to be a myth, is a real personage. She is a graduate nurse, now in attendance it is said upon a patient in the Holland house, New York. The Crown Attorney said on Saturday that Miss McCann probably would not come here to testify, but an order for a commission to examine her with regard to her knowledge of the York County Loan and Savings Company and other ventures of Joseph Phillips might be secured from a Superior Court Judge.

### E. H. COCHRANE ELECTED.

Graduating Class at U. N. B. Chose Valedictorian This Morning.

Dr. Scott Likely to Accept Offer to Go to Calgary.

Rumored—Changes in Faculty Not Likely to be True.

It has been rumored for some days past that Chancellor Harrison and Professor Geoghegan, of the University of New Brunswick, had resigned and that Chancellor Harrison was to be succeeded by Dr. H. S. Bridges of St. John.

Dr. Inch, president of the University Senate, was asked this afternoon concerning the truth of the rumors. He said that it was the first he had heard of it and he did not seem inclined to treat the rumors at all seriously.

Dr. Inch said however that he understood that Dr. Scott had decided to accept the position of Superintendent of the Calgary Schools providing that they would wait until the close of the collegiate year for him to go there.

At a meeting of the graduating class of U. N. B. held this morning Mr. E. H. Cochrane was elected valedictorian. It was also decided to ask a graduate of the University to preach the baccalaureate sermon the Sunday before Easter.

The following officers have been elected by the College Y. M. C. A. for the ensuing year. Malcolm Orchard, Pres.; P. R. Hayward, Vice-Pres.; D. R. Sharpe, Sec.; F. A. Jewett, Financial Sec.; Frank Orchard, Librarian. The new cabinet will be announced in a few days.

### OLD HOME WEEK CELEBRATION.

First Subscription to Citizens Fund Reaches Treasurer McLeod.

Mr. Oswald S. Crockett, M. P., Sends Check For \$25.

Prizes Amounting to \$600 to Be Offered For Firemen's Tournament.

The first subscription to the Old Home Week celebration fund has been received, a letter from Mr. O. S. Crockett, M. P., to Secretary Hooper having a check for \$25 enclosed.

Tomorrow the Fire Department expects to be in a position to announce the programme for their tournament on Dominion Day, the opening day of the Celebration. The prize list will amount to about \$600 and the largest prizes will be offered for the hose reel races, the first prize being \$175 and the second prize \$75. There will be three open events on the programme, the 100, 200 and 400 yard runs.
