Greece Shows Signs of Favorable Turn
Will Join Allies When Latter Show More Strength in Balkans

London, Nov. 12.—All doubts as to why the Greeks would choose are dispelled by a public dissolution of the chamber of deputies. Greek officials in London and at other points continue to assert that Greece's future actions depend solely upon military and not political considerations. So soon as Greece is convinced beyond doubt that the Allies have produced enough troops to make possible a successful offensive against Bulgaria and to remove the danger with which Greece would be confronted if she entered the war inadequately assisted, Greece will, so say her representatives in Europe, immediately range herself on the side of the Allies and render all the military co-operation of which she is capable.

To-day's military news from the Balkans makes it appear there is a distinct possibility that the Anglo-French and Serbian forces may succeed in gaining a part of the Nish railway as far as Uskup. All accounts received here of the recent fighting in the neighborhood of Uskup state that the Bulgarians are in full retreat after enormous losses, and that the freshly arriving Allied troops are expected to push to successful conclusion the advance already attained. In this case, the Bulgarians probably would have to abandon the Uskup-Kutanya line and the whole southern portion of the railroad would revert to entente allied hands.

Packing of Parcels For Soldiers at Front
This public is urged to exercise every care in packing parcels for the troops, as careful packing is absolutely essential to ensure delivery of the parcels in good order.

Parcels sent abroad require a higher standard of packing than is necessary in the Canadian Parcel Post and this applies with even greater force to parcels for the troops. Those which are inadequately packed run great risk of damage or loss of contents.

Thin cardboard boxes, such as shoe boxes and thin wooden boxes, should not be used; nor does a single sheet of ordinary brown paper afford sufficient protection. The following forms of packing are recommended:

(I)—Strong, double cardboard boxes, preferably those made of corrugated cardboard, and having lids which completely enclose the sides of the boxes.

(II)—Strong wooden boxes.

(III)—Several folds of stout packing paper.

(IV)—Additional security is afforded by an outer covering of linen, calico or canvas, which should be securely sewn up.

The address of the sender of the parcel should be stated in order that it may be returned if undeliverable. The contents of the parcel should be stated in writing on the cover.

In the case of parcels sent to the Mediterranean Force, they should be very strongly packed. They should be as nearly round as possible, and well padded with shavings, crumpled paper, or similar protective material. The outer covering should consist of strong linen, calico or canvas, and should be securely sewn up. The use of wooden or metal boxes with square corners is undesirable, as parcels so packed are liable to injure other parcels in transfer. No perishable articles should be sent, and anything likely to become soft or sticky, such as chocolates, should be enclosed in tins. Parcels merely wrapped in paper or packed in thin cardboard boxes, such as shoe boxes, cannot be accepted.

NAVAL ENGAGEMENT HEARD IN BALTIC
Copenhagen, Nov. 11.—A cannonade of terrific intensity was heard yesterday in the neighborhood of the Feboarn belt in the Baltic Sea. It is believed by those who heard it to have been the result of a British submarine attack on a German squadron. The firing lasted twenty minutes and was of such violence that the windows and doors on houses in the rocky harbor were blown open. Houses vibrated as though in an earthquake. The weather was so thick that it was impossible to observe any details of the engagement.
