

# WITH THE FARMERS

## THE NEW GRAIN ACT.

In view of the fact that the grain shipping season is now under way and that there is a widespread interest in this vital branch of western commerce, The Bulletin publishes some important amendments to the act respecting the inspection and the sale of certain staple commodities. The amendments published are sections 17 and 18 of the "Act to amend Section 17 establishes definitions for Alberta winter wheat, and section 18 defines a "Canadian Western" oats. This term is a new one. Hereafter all western oats are graded hereafter as "Canadian Western" classification. The increase in the quantity grown in the west has rendered a "Canadian Western" classification advisable. The grades are stated by iron in the business and practically the same as in Manitoba oats.

Section 17 reads: "Section 17 is further amended by inserting therein, immediately after the definition of "Spring Wheat," the following definition of "Winter Wheat":

"No. 1 Alberta red winter wheat shall be hard pure red winter wheat, sound and clean, weighing not less than 62 pounds to the bushel.

"No. 2 Alberta red winter wheat shall be hard red winter wheat, sound and clean, weighing not less than 60 pounds to the bushel.

"No. 3 Alberta red winter wheat shall include hard red winter wheat not clean enough or sound enough to be graded No. 2 weighing not less than 57 pounds to the bushel.

"No. 1 Alberta white winter wheat shall be pure white winter wheat, sound and clean, weighing not less than 60 pounds to the bushel.

"No. 2 Alberta white winter wheat shall be white winter wheat, sound and clean, weighing not less than 58 lbs. to the bushel.

"No. 3 Alberta white winter wheat shall include white winter wheat not clean enough or sound enough to be graded No. 2 weighing not less than 55 pounds to the bushel.

"No. 1 Alberta mixed winter wheat shall be red and white winter wheat mixed, sound, clean and free from other grain, and shall contain not less than 42 pounds to the bushel.

"No. 2 Alberta mixed winter wheat shall be red and white winter wheat mixed, sound, clean and free from other grain, and shall weigh not less than 40 pounds to the bushel.

"No. 3 Alberta mixed winter wheat shall be red and white winter wheat mixed, sound, clean and free from other grain, and shall weigh not less than 38 pounds to the bushel.

"No. 1 Canadian Western oats shall be white, sound, clean and free from other grain, and shall weigh not less than 36 pounds to the bushel.

"No. 2 Canadian Western oats shall be sound, reasonably clean and free from other grain, and shall weigh not less than 34 pounds to the bushel.

"No. 3 Canadian Western oats shall be sound, reasonably clean and free from other grain, and shall weigh not less than 32 pounds to the bushel.

## AGRICULTURISTS VISIT THE FORT

### Scottish Commission See Edmonton District and Are Delighted With it.

(From Wednesday's Bulletin.)

"Our visit to Canada is much enlarged and our knowledge much increased by our visit to your country. We are greatly impressed by the glorious possibilities of the West. ## REGINA'S POPULATION 8,975 BY THIS CENSUS

### Committee From Churches Takes a Census—Presbyterians Lead With Roman Catholics Second, Church of England Third and Methodists Fourth.

Regina, Sept. 22.—The census taken last Friday by the special committee composed of workers from the various city churches shows the population of Regina to be 8,975, excluding all transients.

Tabulating the returns under denominational heads, twenty-two nominations are represented in the city as follows: Christian Science 13, Mahomedans 1, Nazarenes 24, Sabatians 2, Universalists 5, Unitarians 8.

Fifty-five people are returned as belonging to no church, and having no church preferences, while sixty-seven belonging to no church are returned to have a church preference. The four leading denominations are given as follows: Presbyterians 2,320, Roman Catholics 1,882, Church of England 1,718, Methodists 1,581. On the whole the census may be said to show the people of Regina to be an extremely church loving community.
