ICELAND GOES TO BOTTOM

By the Florizel yesterday afternoon there arrived Capt. Edmund Kean and 137 men, the crew of the good old sealer Iceland which was crushed in the ice and went to bottom on Wednesday last, the 30th of March.

The ship left Pool's Island on the 12th of March in company with the wooden fleet of ships and struck the seals on Saturday the 19th March about 50 miles E. of the Punks. The ice proved to be very heavy and the work of getting through it difficult. The ship could not force into the main body of the ice, and most of the 5,000 seals which she had on board when the accident occurred were taken on the 26th and 27th March, these being mostly young harps.

The ship for several days was in company with the Eagle, Newfoundland, Bloodhound, Neptune, Ranger, Diana and Aurora; not many seals were taken up to the 30th, and the ship was in a very heavy mass of ice early that morning. During the morning the ice began to come together and rafted. She had been forcing through a lake of water with a heavy swell and high tide running in the ice, when about 9 o'clock she got a bad squeeze between two sheets and began to make water rapidly, the thrush being so rapid that she made 4 inches in 20 minutes. Five pumps were kept going on her but could not keep her free, and later the ice came together with tremendous force and the sides of the ship were crushed, the pans cutting completely through the heavy beams and timbers. The greatest damage was wrought at the

engine room, the discharge pipe was burst up and rendered useless, the topgallant house was crushed in pieces, boats were crushed and general havoc was wrought. Chief Engineer Bradbury who has been at the seal fishery for 62 years kept cool, and with his assistants and firemen held the engine room until the fires were quenched by the rushing water. During this time the men and officers got their clothing and effects on the ice, except 10 who were away after seals and these lost their apparel. When the men left her the water was up to the forecastle floor. Capt. Kean was the last to leave his ship which at 4.45 p.m. went down stern foremost; just previously she had taken fire. Leaving their clothing on the ice the men started to walk to the Eagle, then about two miles distant, and had a hard time of it on the journey, a heavy blizzard with a gale of E. N. E. wind overtook them. Two men while on the way jumped on a small pan which gave way under them and all went into the water. The work of rescue was difficult in the storm, but was effected by the loss of a life, and all were glad when they boarded the Eagle. At dinner hour the next day they secured their clothes and then transferred to the Florizel.

The ship came here in 1872, and during her career was commanded by Capt. Parsons, Blandford, Dawe (2), Wilcox, Smith, Winsor, Bartlett, D. Blandford and Barbour. Capt. Bartlett of the Viking brought her in first in 1887 with 22,075 seals.

Meeting of City Council

REGULAR WEEKLY MEETING.
A full Board was present at last night's meeting. Mayor Gibbs presiding.

The application of S. Noel for the position of Engineer at the Rock Crusher will be considered. The offer of Mr. P. H. Cowan to supply "Kretol" as a disinfectant was referred to the Sanitary Supervisor. The letter of Messrs. Horwood & Best re water and sewerage on Power St. will be considered next meeting.

An enquiry was ordered on the application of J. R. Bennett for street line on Leslie Street. Wm. Mugford who is interested in building on Barron St. will be informed that no one will be allowed to build within 25 feet of the centre of the street.

The Secretary will inform Mr. Lemire that they do not require any maps at the present time. The application of H. Yabsley for permission to erect a fence was referred to the Engineer.

The tender of Mr. T. Stamp to supply quarry spawls at 50 cents a ton was accepted. Andrew J. Murphy tendered to supply 5 horses at \$220 each. The others who tendered were J. Fergus Donnelly, at \$260 each; W. J. Dowden, \$250 each, and S. Cole, \$250 each. W. J. Croft, Signal Hill, was given permission to build an out-house; and H. Cook, Charlton St., was given a permit to alter his cooerage.

Plans of houses for Mrs. J. Kelly, 1 Doran, Signal Hill, T. J. Duley, Water Street, and Messrs. Sampson & House were signed. Reports were received from the Solicitor on the right of the Council in re the public cove at Harvey & Co.'s premises; also re the Gas Co.'s claim to a right of way over the promenade, and the Council's attitude on Tom Lees laundry, Rennie's Mill Road. Action was deferred in all cases. The Council cannot prevent Tom Lee from conducting the laundry.

The resolutions in reference to taxing theatricials and five cent shows were allowed to stand over for a special meeting.

The Engineer's weekly report was submitted and approved. On the report of the Waste Water Inspector a number of householders on Duckworth St. East will be ordered to repair their taps, otherwise they will be summoned. After passing the weekly pay rolls and bills the meeting closed at 10.35.
