Why is it, I wonder, that a people of reserve and taste in most matters, so frequently offend the canons of both by having their living rooms and reception rooms and even their dining rooms, lavishly hung with photographs of their family and relatives and intimate friends?
That the rooms which are used for the entertainment of general company should be decorated chiefly with impersonal pictures, pictures of general interest, seems to me just as much a law of taste and politeness as that conversation with these people should be of general interest rather than on personal matters.
You would never think of cramming your relatives and intimates into your caller's ears by talking constantly about them. Why, then, should you foist them upon her eyes by covering the walls of the room in which you entertain her, with nothing but their pictures.
The private den or study or work-room where only the most intimate friends are taken, or the citadel of one's private personality, one's own chamber, seem to me the proper places for these picture galleries, and yet how seldom we see a home where this rule is strictly adhered to.
I suppose it is partly because in these days of frequent and easy picture taking, most of us have so many photographs of our friends in our possession that they overflow our private quarters and inundate the whole house.
Quite frequently the gift of a photograph, fond though we may be of its original and glad though we may be to receive it, brings a problem in its wake.
We show it to the people who will be especially interested in it. It lies about on our desk or table for a few days, and then what? If we stand it up or tack it up unframed it will surely spoil and discolor. We do not feel just like taking the money to buy a frame especially for it. And yet we would surely have been offended if that friend had passed us by in the distribution of her pictures.
I know one girl who solves this little problem in a way that will surely interest for its uniqueness even if it does not appeal. She has about a half dozen frames which are all there in space for in her room. These frames are so made that the pictures can easily be slipped in and out. Every few weeks she changes the pictures in them so that she has all her friends looking down upon her from time to time.
In this connection let me suggest that for an inexpensive birthday or Christmas gift, I know of nothing that will be more sure to fill a niche of need than a small frame, suitable for a photograph. Let it be of any sort of oval or brass or bronze or the simplest of wood frames, and it will undeniably find a welcome, for show me the person who has not more photographs than he has frames for them and I will show you a rarity.

Rosalind's Rough Trip.

The s.s. Rosalind, Capt. Smith, arrived here at 7 p.m. yesterday from Halifax and New York. She left New York at 4 p.m. Saturday and had a good run to Halifax, where she arrived Monday evening. She left again at 6 a.m. Tuesday and had fine weather until about noon Wednesday, when the wind became heavy and a high sea began running. The ship was then 160 miles west of Cape Race. The gale increased as the hours went by, and Wednesday night the ship had a terrible time of it. The wind blew from the N.E. with sleet and rain, and by midnight had reached hurricane force while sea after sea swept the ship. She was badly buffeted, and four horses which with others were in their stalls on deck, were killed and had to be thrown overboard. The storm continued all yesterday and last evening and greatly impeded the ship. She reached Cape Race at 8.15 a.m. yesterday, and it took her 11 hours to run from that point to port. The ship could not moor at Harvey & Co's. pier and had to anchor in the stream. She brought a full cargo, much mail matter and these passengers: W. C. Langley, Hon. V. G. Winter, J. Walsh, W. H. Supreme Court.

(Before The Chief Justice and Mr. Justice Johnson.)
A. A. Telegraph Co. vs. Reid Nfld. Co.
This is an application for leave to appeal to His Majesty in the Privy Council from the judgment of this Court given on February 1st, 1911, upon the plea of the Statute of Limitations. Sir J. S. Winter, K. C., for the appellants, moves for leave to appeal. Mr. Greene, K. C., for the respondent, opposes the application on the ground that the appellants have not complied with the rules respecting Appeals to His Majesty in His Privy Council. Notice of the Appeal had not been given to the respondents within 14 days after the delivery of the judgment. An argument ensued in which the question of the plea being bad in substance or in form was canvassed.
The Chief Justice was of opinion that leave should be granted to appeal. Mr. Justice Johnston did not concur.
Sir J. S. Winter, K. C., and Mr. Furlong, K. C., for appellant; and Mr. Greene, K. C., for respondent.

Schr. Dismasted.

At Rose Blanche last Wednesday in the height of the storm the schooner Garnet had her spars carried away by being run into by the schooner Tenus. The Garnet is owned by Mr. Joseph Baker, of Mortier Bay, and was there on her way to the Banks. One of the crew of the Garnet was seriously injured.

SOLIGNUM.
A Remarkable Test! Locally made by Messrs. W. & G. RENDELL.
To test Solignum as a preservative for Wood against the attacks of Worms, we tried a piece of 2 x 4 spruce, about two feet in length, by painting one-third with Solignum, leaving the balance clear wood, this we suspended by a wire through the centre, in the water about one foot from the bottom, immediately over a pile of stones the remains of a sunken wharf (which is the place where our Wharf Shores are eaten off first) for Three Months. On taking it up at the end of that time we found some half-dozen small holes, only a very short distance in the clear part of the wood, which shows the liquid had penetrated through the whole piece and the worms had hardly begun boring before coming in contact with it.
Last year as a test of some brands of Copper Paint we handle, we had a similar piece of wood treated at both ends, leaving the centre third clear; this was in exactly the same place as the piece for the Solignum test for Three Months and Three Days, when taken up the painted ends were perfect but the centre was riddled with worm holes.
Both these pieces of wood are to be seen at our Office by those interested in the preservation of W.L.R.P. Piles or any other wood work.
