Imperial Conference.

To-day the Imperial Conference assembles in London. The object of the assembly is for the States of the Empire to take counsel together for the common weal of the Empire. At the last conference a number of resolutions were passed. First and foremost amongst them was one which dealt with the constitution and objects of future conferences. The conference which meets to-day is the first under that arrangement. The resolution runs as follows:—

"That it will be to the advantage of the Empire if the Conference, to be called the Imperial Conference, is held every four years, at which questions of common interest may be discussed and considered as between His Majesty's Government and his Governments of the self-governing Dominions beyond the Seas. The Prime Minister of the United Kingdom will be ex-officio President, and the Prime Ministers of the self-governing Dominions ex-officio members of the conference. The Secretary of State for the Colonies will be ex-officio member of the conference, and will take the chair in the absence of the President. He will arrange for such Imperial Conferences after communication with the Prime Ministers of the respective Dominions.

"Such other Ministers as the respective Governments may appoint will also be members of the Conference, each discussion will be conducted by not more than two representatives from each Government and that each Government will have only one vote.

"That it is desirable to establish a system by which the several Governments represented in the Conference, formed during the periods between the Conferences in regard to matters which have been or may be subjects for discussion, by means of a permanent secretariat staff, charged, under the direction of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, with the duty of obtaining information for the use of the Conference, of attending to its resolutions, and of conducting correspondence on matters relating to its affairs.

"That upon matters of importance, or more Governments which cannot conveniently be postponed until the next Conference, or involving subjects of a minor character or such as call for detailed consideration, subsidiary Conferences should be held between representatives of the Governments concerned specially chosen for the purpose."

REPLACES THE CARDENIA.

Capt. Wm. Carroll goes to Hr. Breton by the train to-morrow to take charge of the schr. Emma White of 70 tons, which he has purchased to replace the lost Cardenia. He will trade between Halifax, Sydney and the West Coast in the vessel.

EXTERMINATING WILD GESE.

We learn from people who recently arrived from the northward in schooners that wild geese are being exterminated at Gambo, Alexander Bay and Port Blanford. Men have been going to their haunts up country, kill the young and mother birds, steal and destroy the eggs taken from the nests and will soon kill these fine birds out altogether. Another feature of this work is that it is a cloak for the illicit killing of deer. The authorities should look in to this matter.

COD, SALMON AND LOBSTERS.

Cod, salmon and lobsters were sold in the city to-day by Portage Cove men. Cod fetched from 20 to 30 cents each; salmon, 30 cents lb.; lobsters from 15 to 40 cents each.

TO GREENLAND HALIBUTING.

The American schooner Oregon, of Gloucester, called into Bay Bulls this morning for a supply of fresh water. She is bound down to Greenland to prosecute the halibut fishery there.

TWENTY-THREE SAILERS.

Twenty-three men sailed by the Corinthian yesterday to bring out the new ship Stephano. These include Capt. J. Vine, 2nd mate Duder and assistant steward Snow. The rest are seamen, firemen and engineers.

CHILD ASTRAY.

Little Willie Mallard went astray from his home at McFarlane Street yesterday. He was found at Waterford Bridge by two boys who brought him to the West End Firehall where his mother found him at 8 o'clock at night.

PATIENTS FOR HOSPITAL.

A woman from Hant's Harbor is coming in to-night's train to go to Hospital, also a man and a child from Harbor Grace. By this morning's train Fred Rowe who is suffering from a bad knee came in and was taken to the Hospital by Mr. E. Whiteaway.

DIPHThERIA AT CAPE FRELES.

Saturday the Health Authorities were advised that diphtheria had developed at Cape Island, a small island near Cape Freles. Five cases were reported in three houses, which are under quarantine. Two deaths have occurred and the magistrate and doctor of the place are doing their best to cope with the situation.

MORE DIPHThERIA REPORTED.

A boy 13 years old, a resident of Hamilton Avenue, developed diphtheria Saturday evening and is being nursed at home. Dr. Brehm returned from Petty Harbor Saturday. There was one death in the Chafe family of diphtheria, and the other patient, a little girl, is very much better and will be around again after a couple of days.

FOGOTA ARRIVED.

The S. S. Fogota returned from the North at 4 a.m. yesterday. The saloon passenger list is:—Mrs. Barbour, J. R. White, J. F. Abbott, Mrs. Abbott, two children, Miss McLean, W. J. Duder, J. Turner, J. Brocklehurst, W. Harris and 12 in second cabin. Last Wednesday the ship met a heavy snow storm while crossing Bonavista Bay while going down. The return trip was favourable. She brought a small freight.

FISHERY NEWS.

During the past week several schooners have left Twillingate for the French Shore to prosecute the fishery. At King's Cove there is a good sign of fish. Brown's trap secured 9 qts. in two hauls to-day. No line men are yet on the grounds. Conception Harbor reports a good sign of cod to-day at Racon Cove. Salmon are also plentiful. There was a good sign of cod at Trinity Saturday.
