F. P. U. Protest to Government.

TWINNINGS, To-day.
The Twinnings District Meeting of the F. P. U. opened here at 2.30 yesterday and immediately resolved to transmit the following protest to Sir E. P. Morris.

"The District Council of Twinnings, in session, protest against lumbering operations on the three mile limit at Hall's Bay by Edward Brown, and desires the Government to enforce the Crown Lands Act respecting same. If Brown's operations are permitted, they will ruin the only green spot of timber at Hall's Bay. The Council also wishes to have law enforced to protect all green timber on the islands in Green Bay and have the same reserved for fishery uses."

OTTAWA, To-day.
The debate on the Laurier amendment to the address in Reply to the Speech from the Throne terminated at midnight. The amendment was defeated by a majority of 48 rather more than the Government's normal superiority. Mondou's amendment that the contribution to the Naval forces of the Empire would not be justified as long as the United Kingdom controls the international policy of the Empire became up was briefly debated. It was defeated by 183 to 4. Laurier voting with the majority. The debating through the day was noteworthy for an attack by Lemieux which drew from J. H. Rainville an emphatic denial of the assertion frequently made that he had said that Canada owes nothing to England.

That Drowning Accident.

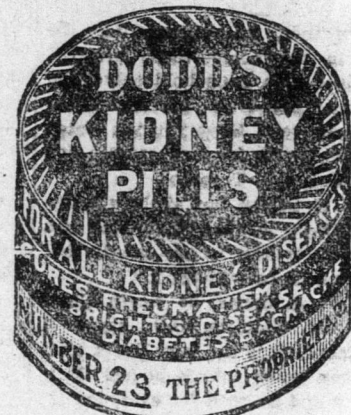
Passengers by the express to-day say that the two men, Hayse and Kearney, were crossing Maher's Pond on Monday when their boat, which was overloaded, sank suddenly under them. They were going off in the woods to cut firewood and the accident was witnessed by a number of friends, who were not near enough to render assistance. Kearney, who was a good swimmer, made a desperate attempt to save his life. While in the water he stripped himself of most of his clothing and swam a short distance, when he suddenly threw up his hands and sank to rise no more. Hayse sank very quickly. Both men were single. The bodies were brought to Cupids by special train and were interred this afternoon.

Schr. Ashore.

The Mutual Marine Insurance Co. had a message this morning saying that the schr. Queen Queen struck a rock at the entrance to Little St. Lawrence, Monday. The vessel is owned by M. T. Flynn, of Mortier Bay, and is insured in the company. The vessel was hoisted off yesterday at high tide and was beached in safety. It is not thought she is badly damaged. Had the vessel been there to-day she would have become a total loss as a gale of wind blows there with a heavy sea.

Montreal Man Was Beaten To Death.

Montreal, Nov. 27.—Joseph LaJonde, a fifty-two year old sewing Machine agent, died yesterday evening as the result of a vicious assault on the part of four casual acquaintances he met the previous evening in a saloon. Just before he died LaJonde told his mother that he had been inveigled into a barn by his new friends and there had been beaten and robbed. When he regained consciousness he found himself lying on the roadway near the mountain, whence he managed to stagger home. His injuries were not thought to be serious but he grew weaker as the day progressed, and died early in the evening. He could give no description of his assailants.
