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An Eye-Opener!

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—One would imagine by reading the Herald with its fulsome flattery of Premier Morris and his Government that the people of the country were delighted with the reckless expenditures of money now being trusted to their care. The bombastic utterances of its Editor in his editorial of the 4th April would have us believe so, for he says: "the utter collapse of the Opposition Party in this country is attested by the fact that the sittings of the Assembly each afternoon attract not more than three or four people, the clearest proof that the electors are well satisfied with the Government's great record on their behalf." What a whopper. On their people's behalf indeed, this is another freak of the editor's imagination. He also states that the proceedings in the House of Assembly have become so tame of late that the spectators are now drifting over to the Legislative Council. What are we to infer from this. Is there some great oracle there just now that attract people thither. If so, the Premier should make room in the lower house for the object of this attraction and so fill the seats now said to be vacant there, but if the people of St. John's are as much disgusted with the doings of the present Government as we are in the out-harbour, then I fear even the addition of this attractive oracle would not have the desired effect.

Mr. Kent's remarks in the house about the contracts for steamers, about to be awarded to the Reids without explaining to the House the nature, cost, etc., of said contracts was an eye-opener and showed that the Opposition Party had not collapsed as stated by the Herald. The request by the Government to have the passing of the contract to Reids left wholly in the hands of the Executive only strengthens the opinions held by the masses that the Reids were the real rulers and for some reason or other the Government must dance to the contractors' tune. If this were not so, why would the Government allow Reid to build more Branch Railways than they can successfully operate. Of what use are the railways unless they can be operated in the interest of the people who are paying through the nose for them? Will any sane individual tell us that the present railway system is a success or operated in the interest of the people of this country. The delay occasioned in handling freight alone is proof that it is not and we have no redress until the rolling day.

Then is it not worse than madness to go on building branches until such time as the Contractor can sufficiently demonstrate his ability to operate successfully the trunk line and the branches already built? This, I submit, he has not done to the satisfaction of the public, and until he does this there should not be any more money expended upon them. Millions of dollars are being borrowed yearly for the Reids to build branch railways, some of which, it is said, will never earn enough to pay for the axle grease required for the cars. Of course this makes no difference to the Contractor, for he is paid in cash for every mile of road he builds; consequently it's a matter of indifference to him whether they are operated or not. It is the people of the country who will have to bear the brunt of this stupid and reckless expenditure. The time is not far distant when the taxpayers of this country will assert their manhood and let both Morris and the Reids know that they will no longer submit to be more machines from which the Reids can grind their gold. "Millions of dollars of our money have already gone into the coffers of the Reids, and there are millions more to follow them. Is it not passing strange that when money is absolutely needed in the out-harbour for public improvements, such as roads, bridges, wharves, breakwaters, etc., we cannot get the amount necessary for such improvements; but let Reids only build branch railways and millions are forthcoming? Why is this? Perhaps the Premier would enlighten us.

THE GOOD OLD TIMES!


