COATICOOK, Que., August 19.
Harry K. Thaw was arrested here to-day, and is being held awaiting instructions from Ottawa.

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 19.
An explosion on a gondola loaded with dynamite on the tracks of the street car company in a thickly settled portion of Tacubaya, a suburb of this city, resulted in the killing or injuring more than one hundred persons, chiefly women and children.

LONDON, August 19.
M. Philouze, editor of La Correspondence d'Orient, estimates that the two Balkan campaigns cost the belligerents no less than five hundred million dollars. In addition to this he adds a further sum of four hundred millions, which he reckons for bringing their armaments up to date.

ALBANY, N.Y., August 19.
Lieut.-Governor Glynn is the lawful choice of the executive of New York State, pending the outcome of the impeachment proceedings against Governor Sulzer, according to the official opinion rendered to-day by Attorney General Carmody, who also holds that the Assembly was within its rights in instituting impeachment proceedings at an extraordinary session.

OTTAWA, August 19.
Harry K. Thaw will be deported from Canada under the present plans of the Canadian Immigration Department, because within the meaning of the Immigration Act he is regarded as a prohibited person. Section 40 provides that idiots, imbeciles, insane people or criminals shall not enter the country and if they succeed in eluding the officers they shall be deported forthwith.

MEXICO CITY, August 19.
Face to face in conference during the night, ex-Governor Lind and President Huerta are believed to have reached an understanding which may prevent the severance of relations between the United States and Mexico, and serve to continue the negotiations in which Washington may play the role of mediator. Neither at the National Palace nor at the American Embassy were any details of the conference given out, but it is known that Lind now considers the so-called ultimatum announced through the Minister of the Interior late last night, as unauthorized.

SOFIA, August 20.
The Turks have occupied Kucuk Kahoak, in Jamulk, after an engagement with the small Bulgarian garrison. It is believed Turkey intends to occupy and hold the territory westward to the Mesta River, not with a view to permanent occupation, but in order to compel Bulgaria to treat directly with Turkey on the question of Adrianople and thus prevent interference by the Powers. There are some indications that Greece is acting in collusion with Turkey. Greece has announced her readiness to evacuate Xanthi and other places next Thursday, with the suggestion that Bulgaria occupy them next day. Owing to difficulties of communication this is impossible, and Bulgaria has requested a postponement of evacuation until August 28th. The opinion is expressed, however, that Greece will adhere to her plan and evacuate these towns on Thursday and thus enable the Turks to occupy them in advance of the Bulgarians.

SHERBROOKE, Que., Aug. 20.
Harry K. Thaw, whose flight from the asylum at Matteawan, was cut short yesterday by his arrest in the village of St. Hermenegild de Garforte, just over the international line from New Hampshire, will make a bitter fight against being sent back to the United States. Thaw faces deportation on the ground that he is an undesirable alien and extradition on a warrant charging him with bribery, which is an extraditable offence. Thaw claims he was merely passing through Canada on his way to Detroit when his passage was interrupted by arrest, and consequently the Canadian authorities had no right to interfere with him. W. L. Shurtleff, a Coaticook lawyer, retained by Thaw, denounced the hearing before Justice Dupuis as unfair, and said he would apply for a writ of Habeas Corpus for Thaw. Should the writ be refused, he will appeal. There is every indication that Thaw intends to write into the Judicature of the Dominion of Canada the record of a bitterly contested fight against extradition, deportation, or both.

PITTSBURG, August 19.
"I am pretty sure the man they have in Canada is not Harry K. Thaw," declared Roger O'Mara, Thaw's guardian, here this morning. "I am convinced he is not in Canada." O'Mara refused to say on what he based his opinion but was evidently pleased with the situation.
