Revelations of an exciting character may be made in the Lords next week, when Lord Selborne will raise a discussion concerning contributions to Party funds and the distribution of honors. Lord Charnwood, Radical Peer, will propose that in view of persistent allegations, imply-

ing that contributions to Party Funds have been a consideration with Ministers in recommending names to the King for honors, the House would welcome an assurance from the Government that such allegations are untrue, and that the House urges the immediate appointment of a Royal Commission to enquire how such abuses may be most effectively restrained.

Several beautiful lantern slides were exhibited during the discourse, the machine being manipulated by Mr. T. Armstrong.

Hekey, was heartily accorded the reverend lecturer, after which the President addressed the audience and outlined the policy of the Society, and took occasion to congratulate the committee under whose auspices the interesting entertainment was inaugurated.

City's Health.

At the City Hall

Yesterday's meeting of the City Council was attended by the Mayor and full board.

The Gas Co. wrote informing the Council that the lights complained of are being attended to.

The Pope Manufacturing Co., coming to be requested to forward plans for George Street. Matter for the police J. R. Johnston asked permission to alter O'Mara's building, King's Road.

He will be requested to forward plans. The Premier forwarded letters from the President of Truckmen's Union and Secretary of the S.P.A. The former complained of the untidiness of youths of 14 and 15 years who are engaged as drivers of express cars, etc.

Such drivers are responsible for many accidents that would be averted if competent men were in charge. The President of the union suggested that no licenses be issued to those under 18 years.

The S.P.A. wrote along the same lines, and suggested a similar remedy. The matter will be fully considered.

The following letter from the Premier was read:—

Prime Minister's Office, St. John's, Nfld., 11 February, 1914.

Dear Sir,—You will remember my discussing with you a day or two ago the question of the pay of the city firemen. I then pointed out to you that only recently the matter had come before the House of Assembly, when we were discussing the Police votes. On that occasion, as on previous occasions, I explained the history of the Fire Department in St. John's, and how the general Government came to pay out of the public revenues towards its upkeep.

After the great fire of 1892 the representatives for St. John's brought to the notice of the Government of that day the great hardships under which many of the people of St. John's suffered owing to the destruction of property in the fire. It was estimated at that time that the loss to citizens

amounted to something like twelve million dollars, whereas the amount of property insured represented only about half of that sum; that in order to reproduce this twelve million dollars' worth of property destroyed very large importations of stocks, building materials and furniture, etc., would have to be made, and by reason of this the general revenue would profit, for a great number of years, by the loss of the people of St. John's, and from that standpoint the Government would be justified in (first) erecting and equipping at the expense of the general revenue three firehalls in the city, and (second) giving an annual grant towards its maintenance.

That grant was fixed then in 1893 at a certain sum, in consideration of the St. John's Municipal Council making a contribution towards it, I think of \$1200 or \$1400. Since 1893 the Fire Department has been conducted as a sub-department of the Department of Justice, in connection with the Constabulary, and the contribution towards the maintenance of the Fire Department gradually grew from the small sum, first voted in 1893, to \$15,000 voted in 1898, and, since then, by small annual increases, it has grown year after year until it had reached the sum of \$23,843.75, which was the amount voted by the Government in the session of 1913, and which represents, less the contribution by the Municipal Council, the vote of the General Government to what is purely a municipal service. This session we have still further increased the vote, on the recommendation of the head of the Fire Department, by an additional amount of \$218.75. This does not, however, give any increase to the wages of the firemen, and all are agreed that there is no more deserving class in the community than our firemen; and that whilst we are safe and comfortable in our homes, they are keeping watch and ward over the city, and are exposed to wet and cold and danger all the year round.

For these reasons I think the time has come when the salaries of the men should be considered by the Municipal Council, and that a small annual increase should be made year after year until the salaries of the men will have reached a point which would be in keeping with a fair remuneration for the serious and important work in which they are engaged. You will serve with me, I am sure, in fact you always have when we have discussed this matter, that if we hope to retain the present members of the Brigade, and if we are to look confidently to

the future for desirable recruits for the service, we must pay them a living wage.

I could be thankful if you would bring this matter before the next meeting of the Municipal Council.
