LET'S HAVE SOME MORE DISCOVERIES.



When the astronomer discovered a new planet, there is much excitement in scientific circles and headlines of the newspapers, but the rest of us don't really feel much excited.

Why should we? We can't even know the names of the many thousands of stars that have already been located, and one or more less makes no difference in our personal lives.

But in my newspaper the other morning I saw mentioned a discovery which though much smaller in area will interest all of the human race who eat, and will be of absorbing interest to the half who plan what the other half eat.

A Successor To The Grapefruit. A new fruit has been discovered. That is, it has recently been recognized as a possible fruit for the tropics and the Philippines. It has been found that it can be grown in the West Indies and transported here and it has been prophesied that a few years from now the "durian" will have become as popular as that other tropical newcomer, the grapefruit.

I don't suppose anyone under 20 realizes that the grapefruit is a newcomer any more than we under 50 realize that the orange was once considered a luxury, the sort of thing that children were glad to find in their stockings at Christmas. But I can remember the first time that my mother gave us each a spoonful of grapefruit. And how I hated it, incidentally.

Cream Cheese and Brown Sherry. The durian is said to taste "like a rich custard which has been dosed with almond extract," and one scientist says there are also "wafts of flavor which also call to mind cream cheese, onion sauce, brown sherry and other incongruities."

Mr. Eater? And doesn't it thrill you, Mrs. Menu-maker, with the thought of something new to have for dessert?

Let us hope that this is the beginning of an age of discovery in the line of foods.

Wanted, Two New Meats and Vegetables. I think we badly need at least two new meats and two new vegetables. One of the two new meats should be something as staple as beef but totally different in flavor. If the discoverer would also arrange to have it very different in place I would give him a vote for a niche in the hall of fame.

The other should be a meat like ham that can be kept, but should, of course, be quite different in taste from ham. A cross between ham and beef would make an interesting meat.

As to the two new vegetables, they should be not exotic and choice like asparagus; not the kind that you have to cultivate a taste for like Brussels sprouts, nor the unsubstantial kind like radishes and lettuce, but a good every day vegetable like peas

French Security

Springfield Republican: Evidently the new Premier in reverting to the politics of Foch, does not intend to put France in jeopardy; the new Ministry will enforce the treaty so far as disarmament is concerned, and in this programme it has the explicit support of Mr. MacDonald. What Great Britain desires is not more armaments for Germany, but a reduction of armaments all around, to which, according to the Treaty of Versailles, the disarmament of Germany is but a preliminary. Execution of the disarmament clauses was almost completed when the invasion of the Ruhr interrupted the work of the commission, resumption of which has lately been a matter of controversy. If Germany sincerely desires peace the size of its army matters little, and to allow friction on this point to interfere with a settlement would be folly.

Mandates and the Leagues

Manchester Guardian: The mandate system is not all that it was at one time hoped it would be, but it is fundamentally sound if we can live up to it. The point is that the mandatory Powers must be made by the public conscience and by the League of Nations, to which they have to render account to live up to their duties. Sir Frederick Lugard put his finger on the heart of the business when he said that no difficulties or mistakes must be allowed to obscure the fundamental principle of trusteeship and responsibility to a supervisory authority. If there is a lively public opinion operating through the League of Nations on the Governments concerned—and that is where the co-operation of the United States would be so helpful—the experiment can be

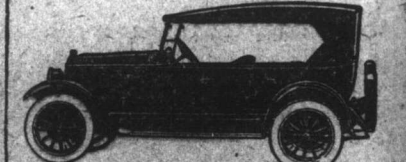
