Worth Knowing

When it is convenient to wash a floor, boards may be cleaned by rubbing silver sand into the grain of the wood, using a short-bristled brush, and working in the direction of the grain. Use a softer brush to remove the sand.
Light bamboo and basket-work tables and chairs, when used out of doors, soon get soiled, but they clean easily if scrubbed with a small brush dipped first in warm water and then in kitchen salt. Wipe with clean damp cloths and dry in the sun.
Occasionally flat irons should be scoured by washing in hot soda water and soap, scrubbing with a brush. After this they should, of course, be dried. A new iron needs to be broken into work by being heated for several hours and then cleaned. This process should be repeated for three or four days.

Nothing spoils the look of a kitchen more than a discoloured top to the kitchen table. To keep really in first-class condition quite a lot of back-scrubbing must be put into it. The same result may be obtained, but with considerable less labor, if a few drops of ammonia are added to the water in which it is cleaned. It will make it snowy-white, and counteract any tendency towards yellowness that the wood may display.

Encouraging Fishery Reports

The following fishery reports have been received by the Board of Trade from various parts of the island for the past week:—

Bonaville—From Amherst Cove to Cape LaRue, 2100 qts. Good fishing is reported with traps, but not very much with hook and lines and trawls. No. of traps in water 127. Boats fishing 210.

Trinity—From Little Hr. to Hickman's Hr., 25 qts. Squid plentiful. Turbot fairly plentiful from Thoroughfare to Random Head.

Placentia and St. Mary's—1600 qts. Burgeo and LaPole—150 qts. The salmon and trap fishing in this section has now ended, the fishermen having taken their nets and trawls out of the water.

Fortune Bay—25 qts. The codfishery is reported very good at present, although the bait supply is scarce. Total qts. landed to date 232. The codfishery prospects for distant good, but failure for the two traps operated by S. Young & Bros.

Burda—4100 qts. The shore fishermen have been doing well with figures all week.

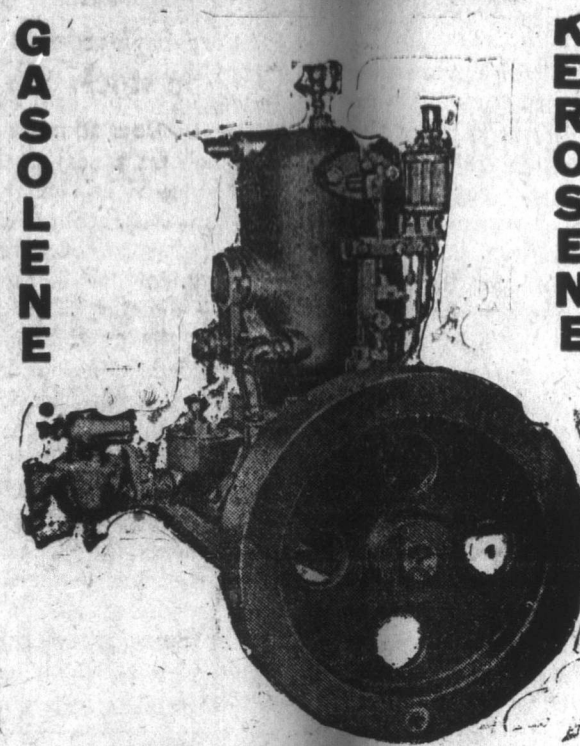
Ferryland—120 qts. Total to date, 1520 qts. Plenty of bait for fishing.
