Shop Early

With mild weather at this time of the year the tendency is to overlook the fact that Christmas is approaching, and to put off purchasing the necessary supplies until the last minute, with the result that the clerks in the stores and the expressmen on the eve of Christmas are hard put to it to satisfy the demands of customers.

Now that the stores are open after six o'clock, there is every opportunity for shoppers to make their purchases well ahead of time, and by availing of it, they will not only materially assist in lightening the work of the employees, but will themselves be far better satisfied with the result of their shopping.

The Recovery in British Industries

So much is said of the unemployment and the depression in industries in Great Britain that an altogether false impression is given of the actual progress that is being made. During the past year a change has come over the scene in many important respects, and there seems to be every indication that the crisis has been passed and the country is well on the road to recovery. Recently a newspaper correspondent visited the Midlands to try and discover the actual state of affairs, and his report of the industrial activities in such centres as Birmingham is the very reverse of the gloomy accounts that have been circulated broadcast.

This writer finds that there has been a complete transformation in certain directions; for example, the famous Small Arms Co. have given over a considerable portion of their immense plant for the manufacture of motor cars, motor cycles, bicycles, and other such vehicles. So great is the demand for these goods in the world markets, that during the year the number of unemployed in the city has been reduced by fifty thousand, and it is confidently expected that during the winter there will be no unemployment relief necessary for the first time in seven years.

"Buy British made goods" is being made a slogan throughout the country, and it is being echoed from the furthest dominions. In February will be held a British Industries Fair, which it is hoped will provide the stimulus necessary to place the industrial life of the country on a new footing and usher in a new era.

False Pretences Case

The further hearing of the false pretences case against Messrs. Snow & Griffin, of Colliers, C.B., was continued before Judge Morris yesterday afternoon. Mr. Thos. Tragic Death of 4-Year-Old Boy at Doting Cove

Yesterday morning the body of a four year old boy, the son of the late Moses Abbot, of Doting Cove, in the district of Fogo, was found in an upstairs room of his home, which had been gutted by fire, according to a message received by the Justice Department from the Operator at Musgrave Harbor. The message reads as follows:—

"The house of the late Moses Abbot, of Doting Cove, was badly gutted out by fire this morning. A boy, four years old, being found dead upstairs, by suffocation, the mother being out at the time."

Magistrate's Court

A man convicted for a breach of Section 24, sub-Section 3, of the Alcoholic Liquors Act, was fined \$10.00 or in default 30 days' imprisonment. He went down.
 A medical doctor had a business man on Duckworth Street before Court this morning, suing him for \$30.00 on account of professional services rendered to the occupants of a motor cycle who were injured when in collision with defendant's car, on the Topsail Road, on July 5th. The latter instructed the doctor to attend the party and as they were unwilling to pay for the medical attendance, the bill was sent to the defendant who offered a compromise of \$10.00, which was refused. In the proceedings before Court the defendant put in his counter-claim for driving the doctor to visit the patients. The Judge did not allow the counter-claim, but gave the plaintiff judgment for the full amount. There were no costs as both parties appeared on their own behalf, the defendant making an address of nearly a half hour's duration in summing up the evidence.

Envoy of Riff Chief Seeks Peace

PARIS, Dec. 11.—A despatch from Tangier says that Captain Gordon Cumming, Abd El Krim's representative in London, has arrived there and declares himself the bearer of an official letter from Abd El Krim, proposing certain peace conditions. Authorized circles in Paris are asking how far Captain Cumming is qualified to speak in the name of the Moroccan Chieftain.
 Abd El Krim while recognizing the spiritual authority of the Sultan, it is asserted, demands complete political autonomy for the Riff, including particularly the right to maintain an army.

Government Will Consulk Miners

REGARDING BELL ISLAND OPERATIONS.
 Work at Bell Island has been considerably reduced within the past couple of weeks, and large numbers of men have left to spend the Christmas holidays at home in the various sections of Conception Bay. Operations will, it is expected, be resumed early in January. So far as can be learned there is no shut down of the mines. The Government has not yet entered into any agreement with Beco as to the future, and before doing so the opinions of the mine workers will be sought, and we understand that an invitation has been extended to them to send a delegation here and put their views before the Government.

Turner, who came here a short while ago from England on a health trip, has accepted the position of Organist for an indefinite term at Wesley Church, and we are to understand that he will take up his new duties on Sunday next.
