

PERTH NEW GAOL.—The tenders for the erection of the new gaol at Stratford were opened by the Perth County Council on Monday the 9th inst. The highest tender \$39,497 was put in by Mr. Strickland of Brantford, and the lowest \$27,400 by Messrs. Ferguson & Co. Toronto. This was a difference of \$12,097, and the lowest was \$2,400 above the previously estimated cost. When the tenders came to be considered doubts were entertained by some of the members of the Council whether the lowest tender included the heating apparatus, worth about \$7,000. The matter was finally settled by telegraphing to Messrs. Ferguson & Co., who returned for answer that their tender did not include the article referred to. It was then agreed the tender of Wm. Farquhar of Toronto, to complete the work for \$31,540 should be accepted. We observe that Messrs. Kennedy & Pike, and Mr. Thos Dobbie of Guelph were among the compettors, but the offers of these gentlemen were considerable in advance of either of those just mientioned.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.

Mr. Morris introduced a Bill to prevent capital punishment taking place in public. Mr. Rose moved concurrence in the Excise resolutions, reported from the committee of Ways and Means
Mr. Holton said it would have been better had Government done no more at this first part of the session than to extend the old Canadian tariff to the Maritime Provinces.
Mr. Galt regretted exceedingly that the Government had, at this part of the session, brought down any measure increasing taxatio in the Lower Provinces, as that would alienate the friends of Union and embitter the healtilty of opponents in these Provinces. Conciliation should be the policy, to the extent even of allow-Ontario and Quebec to pay higher dadies. He warmly urged the government to postpone their measures on this subject.
The Premier replied that no favoritism could be shown—all must be treated alike. No injustice, on Mr Galt's own showing, was done to the Maritime Provinces, and that being the case, there was no argument against assimilation. The Government, moreover, must have regard to the interests of the whole Dominion, and not jeopardise these by unworthy attempts to conciliate sections by favors.

Messrs. Howe, Bolton, and several other members from Nova Scotia, protested against the increased taxation imposedupon the Maritime Provinces—some of them expressing pleasure at the alleged wrong, because it would strengthen the feeling against Confederation.

Mr Young said the differential duties on tea were unfair to the West, where green tea was mainly used. Having stated other ejections, he urged the passage of the resolutions as rapidly as possible, preferring to postpone discussion until the tariff question came up for a more permanent esttlement at the next part of the session.
