Ontario Legislative Asse

Hon. Mr. Crooks having moved the House into Committee of Supply, made his financial statement. He first referred to the estimates of 1873, as compared with the actual expenditure for that year, and which were as follows:—

Tothis has to be added the reduced Municipal Loan Fund indebtedness, amounting to \$1,830,122, less the sum of \$556,292, to be written off from the obligations of Lanark, Renfrew, and other municipalities, in accordance with the plan for settling the Canada Central claim, leaving an asset of \$1,273,840, or, deducting 15 per cent, \$1,082,764, making a total surplus of \$5,090, 195. But we are entitled to add to this the improved market value of the Dominion securities in the hands of the Treasurer, amounting to \$250,000, making the surplus \$6,050,195. Against this have to be placed the following liabilities:—Standing to account of the Railway Aid Fund, \$1,100,572; the Railway Subsidy Fund for 1872 and 1873, amounting to \$200,000; the sums due under the Municipal Loan Fund Adjustment Act of last session, \$3,115,736; making a total of liabilities of \$4,416,308, leaving, at the ond of 1874, irrespective of any balance from the revenue of the current year, and after providing for every existing liability, a surplus of \$1,642,887.

We have, however, in addition to this, a valuable asser in the sunple of the Grammar School, common School, and Upper Canada Building Funds in the hands of the Dominion Government, amounting to \$149,694. We have, too, as a further asset, the rent charges accruing from the suns advanced to municipalities for drainage purposes, no less a sum having been so expended under Mr. Carling's Act than \$200,000, the works represented by which are now nearly completed.
