Mr. Davidson moved, seconded by Mr. McCrae, that the Road and Bridge Committee be instructed to have the abutments of the culvert on Wellington street constructed of good cedar cribs, well filled with stone, and the culvert finished in a substantial manner.—Lost.
The hour of adjournment having arrived, Mr. Robertson moved an extension of time for two hours. The motion required at two-thirds vote, and was lost.
Mr. Heffernan moved an adjournment. The motion was carried, and the Council adjourned at ten o'clock.

London, June 14.—Mr. Stewart, a Conservative, has been returned to the House of Commons from Wigan Borough, Scotland.
The corner-stone of St. Catharines street Baptist Church, Montreal, was laid on Saturday afternoon, by the Rev. Mr. Alexander, of Brantford, formerly of the First Baptist Church, of Montreal.
The Department of Justice, at Ottawa, has notified that the troops have arrived safely in Manitoba. The men are in good health, and the horses, baggage and other equipments are in good condition.

STABBING CASE AT INGEROLL.—On Sunday James Demore, of the county of Perth, was severely, if not fatally, stabbed by one Nathaniel Cove, a toll-gate-keeper, just outside of the town, during an altercation about toll money. The injured man's symptoms are unfavorable. The mayor took his ante-mortem statement last night. He is not likely to recover.
John Joseph, a young man living on Laion street, Montreal, while in liquor late on Saturday evening attempted to take his life on one of the principal streets by firing the contents of one chamber of a revolver into his neck. The ball was extracted at the General Hospital. The wound is not serious, and the patient is doing well.

DISASTER IN QUEBEC.—A frightful storm occurred on the evening of the 7th inst. at St. Joseph de la Beauce, Quebec, lasting from 10:30 p.m. to 1:30 a.m.—It was accompanied by torrents of rain, thunder and lightning. In a remarkably short time streams and rivers were overflowed. On one river three saw mills were blown down, and two flour-mills were seriously damaged. Further off, barns and houses were overturned. The damages are estimated at \$30,000, and extend to a surface of four leagues.

THE FISHING.—Newfoundland advices represent the shore fishery from Cape Francois to Cape Rise as encouraging. There are good prospects also at Cape Dine, some boats having taken from 20 to 30 quintals. The American fishing schooner Elizabeth Foster, was at St. John's on the 3rd, from the Banks, with 400 quintals. She reports plenty of fish. On the 30th May she spoke the American schooner Annie G. Quiner, of Beverly, with 400 quintals. Herring were in abundance all the season on the coast and very cheap. Over 50,000 barrels had been thrown away, not being required for bait.
