CALGARY WILL KEEP WAGNER CENTENARY

Thursday next, May 22, will be the hundredth anniversary of the birth of the famous composer and man of letters, Richard Wagner. There will be world-wide celebrations of the occasion particularly in Germany and England. At Bayreuth, which was for many years the home of the distinguished musician, there will be a general holiday and various festivities in honor of the centenary.

The centenary will be celebrated in Calgary by a Wagner recital to be given by Wilfrid V. Oaten and the choir of the Central Methodist church, assisted by Miss Florence Bruce, contralto, and Wilbur Horner, baritone. The recital will be held next Thursday evening, May 22, at 8 o'clock, in Central Methodist church. Mr. Oaten will render several organ numbers and the choir will give the chorale "Ave Maria" and the finale from "The Mastersingers." Also the spinning chorus from "The Flying Dutchman."

ACTORS WHO DIED ON STAGE

The sudden death of Van Blene, the "celist, while on the stage playing in "The Broken Melody" in which he had appeared all over the world, recalls to an exchange many similar instances of famous actors who expired while in the act of demonstrating their greatest histrionic powers.

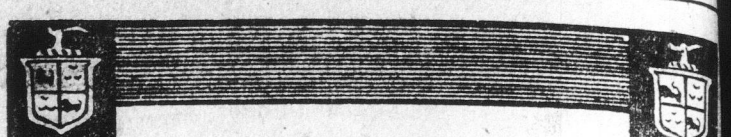
Sir Henry Irving died on the stage of an English theater at the most intense moment of his interpretation of the character of Thomas a Becket. He had partly spoken the prelate's dying lines, "Into Thy hand, O Lord!" when the swift and really fatal end came.

Another actor was stricken down just as he was about to speak another famous dying line. That actor was Samuel Phelps, the greatest and most varied tragedian and comedian within the memory of living playgoers.

He was giving his memorable performance of Cardinal Wolsey at the old Aquarium theatre, London. He had just reached the well-known line, "Farewell, a long farewell to all my greatness," when he fell to the stage, uttering the last line on the boards.

Another striking instance occurred a few years ago at the Novelty theatre, now the Kingsway, in London. A rising young actor named Temple Crozier, died on the stage during the performance. He was accidentally stabbed in the mimic duel in which he was supposed to be killed.

Two of the chief examples of deaths on the stage which occurred before our time were those of Edmund Kean and the heavy man, John Palmer.



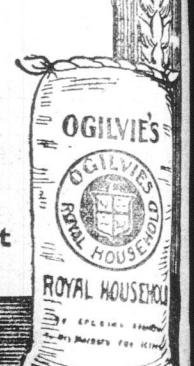
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
