### UNHAPPY RUSSIA

An illuminating article on conditions in Russia is contributed to The Nineteenth Century by Mr. Lesie Urquhart, the manager of a large Russian mine. He recounts the rapid advance in the towns from the moderation of the first Revolution to state of plunder and terrorism. Small revolutionary committees known as the Soviets, encouraged the work men to strike for higher, and still higher wages, until the demands were beyond all reason and industries had to close down. In like manner the railways were disorganized and ruin-

In the country the peasants were informed that they were at liberty to seize all lands. This gave rise to not be made equitably and the strong fought for their claims. The result was a great deal of bloodshed and a practical state of anarchy. main this turmoil has ceased. peasants see that the abolition of property is a two-edged weapon, and are beginning to hoard their foodstuffs. They refuse, in some districts, to sell a pound of wheat or of anything else to the industrial classes. In others, while the peasants are ready to sell, there is no means of transportation. The result is that the towns are beginning to feel the pinch of famine and vast numbers of the extremists find themselves in an unenviable position. Even the

soldiers' rations are being cut down. One may understand the anger that will arise is Russia when the people learn that Lenine is permitting wheat to be sent to Norway—evidently at German dictation. The food problem is most serious in Petrograd and in every town where unbridled license has been running free. In the army, the "new" ideas had their greatest success amongst the infantry. In the opinion of Mr. Brquhart, the cavalry and ar-tillery remained sound at heart. Be-sides, he points out, soldiers of cer-tain infantry units which deserted and made their way back to the interior encountered violent hostility in their native villages. For this and other

easons, Mr. Urquhart thinks that ublic order will yet be restored by Military Dictator, who will have he support of the Cossacks and of moderate minded people of all anks of society.

His belief that it would be possible produce an effective army of 3,000,men is particularly interesting in iew of Trotzky's statement that hos ilities might be resumed if Germany ejected a peace without annexations indemnities. Trotzky mentioned 3,-0,000 as a possible force. 
