THE VICTORIOUS BRITISH.

Boers Retiring Everywhere Be-
fore Their Advance.

Enemy Are Determined Not to Fight
Until the Kroonstad Hills Are Reached
by Lord Roberts—Nothing As to
French's 10,000 Cavalry for Days—May
Be Detouring Towards Kroonstad—
The Relief of Mafeking.

London, May 8. — (4.20 a.m.) —
The Boers are everywhere retiring be-
fore the British, except on the Natal
frontier and at Mafeking, to the in-
ner circle of their defense. They ap-
pear determined not to fight until
the Kroonstad hills are reached.

Lord Roberts is expected to do an-
other forty or fifty miles, and then
to wait for time, in order to bring up
supplies and to repair the railway.
There are one or two hints in the
despatches from the front that the
may rest for a few days at Smaldeal.

Where is French?
Gen. French's 10,000 cavalry have
not been mentioned in the official or
unofficial despatches for four days.
It is by no means likely that he is
idle, and the conjecture is that he is
either detouring toward Kroonstad or
raiding the Ladybrand district.

Fifteen thousand British are now
operating on the western frontier of
the Free State. As the deadlock at
Warrenton has been broken, and the
Boers are retreating there is nothing
formidable except distance between
Warrenton and Mafeking. The most
hoped-for advice from Mafeking on
April 22 were that the garrison
would be barely able to hold out
for a month. At that time the fever
was spreading.

Boers Will Resist.
According to advices from Maseru,
Basutoland, several thousand Free
Stateers are north of Ladybrand,
where they have collected great
herds. The district is rich in food
for men and horses, and the Boers
seem resolved not to move north-
ward, but to be prepared to resist
where they are. If they are let alone
they will menace the line of commu-
nications after the main British army
has passed into the Transvaal.

Roberts With Kitchener.
Lord Roberts and Lord Kitchener
personally directed the artillery in
the Vet River engagement.

Queen Victoria will send a signed
photograph to Col. Kekewich, the
hero of Kimberley.

Six thousand four hundred and fifty-
eight troops are now at sea on
their way to South Africa. No
others are under orders to go except
as recruits to fill up the losses of re-
giments at the front.

ROBERT'S BULLETIN.

Says Turning Movements Carried Out by
Colonials Was a Dashing Affair—
Praises Canadians.

London, May 8. — Lord Roberts
reports to the War Office in a de-
spatch dated Smaldeal, May 6, after-
noon, as follows:

"We crossed the Vet River this
morning, and are now encamped at
Smaldeal Junction. The enemy is in
full retreat towards Zand River and
Kroonstad."

"The turning movement was made
by the Mounted Infantry just before
dark yesterday. It was a very dash-
ing affair. The Canadians, New South
Wales, New Zealand Rifles and
Queensland Mounted Infantry, who
with each other in the determination
to close with the enemy."

"Captain Anley of the Essex Regi-
ment, commanding the Third Infantry
Battalion, behaved in a very gal-
lant manner."

"The naval guns and the artillery
made excellent practice, particularly
two 5-inch guns used for the first
time with this force."

"We captured a Maxim and 25 pris-
oners. Our casualties are very few,
only 15 wounded, 1 killed and 3
missing."

MOVING ON TO MAFKING.

Gen. Hunter and Paget Joined Hands
Near Warrenton.

London, May 8. — The War Office
has received the following despatch
from Lord Roberts, dated Smaldeal,
May 7, 10.55 a.m.:

"General Hunter, after defeating
the enemy May 4, joined hands with
Paget near Warrenton. The enemy
left 13 killed and wounded on the
ground, and we captured several pris-
oners. Our losses were slight."

"Hunter speaks in high terms of
the gallantry of the Yeomanry under
Colonel Mayrick."

"The enemy have retired from the
front of Thabanchu, and the exceed-
ingly strong position they held is
now occupied by Rundle's division."

FOURTEEN STREAMS CAPTURED.

Verreton, Cape Colony, May 8. —
The Boers have been driven out of
fourteen streams, and the British
are now encamped on the north bank
of the Vaal River.

SOME FURTHER DETAILS.

How Winburg Was Captured and How
Colonials Rushed the Vet.

London, May 8. — A special de-
spatch from Smaldeal dated 9.45 p.
m., Sunday, May 6, gives details of
the occupation of Winburg by the
British. It says: "News has just
come here that Gen. Hamilton is giv-
ing the Boers no rest, and that they
are falling back hurriedly. He en-
tered Winburg to-day after a brisk
fight, in which the Boers fell back so
quickly that one of their guns, in ad-
dition to a Maxim, was abandoned."

Crossed the Vet.
The same despatch, describing the
crossing of the Vet River by the Bri-
tish, says: "The Boer forces en-
trenched on the opposite bank pre-
pared to contest the crossing. Our
guns were brought into play and a
terrible shell fire was directed on the
Boer lines. At the same time the
Queenslanders, under a heavy fire,

dashed across the river, and, advanc-
ing in the open, completely turned
the Boer right. It was dusk, but
nothing could stop the gallant Aus-
tralian. They pushed on again, seiz-
ed a commanding kopje and by bril-
liant movements and continuous fire
drove off the enemy in the darkness.
The first gleam of dawn this morning
found the enemy in full flight and our
men after them, and by 9 o'clock this
morning we entered this important
strategic point."

Reconnaissance From Boshof.
A despatch from Boshof, dated Fri-
day, May 4, says Gen. Methuen made
a reconnaissance from the day pre-
vious to the neighborhood of Sjarf-
kopjes Fontein and located the
Boers' laager. After an unimportant
exchange of fire the Boers removed
their laager. A fairly strong force
of Boers was seen moving north-
wards. Gen. Methuen then returned
to Boshof.

Boers Lost Forty Killed.
Smaldeal, May 7. — The British ar-
rived here without opposition. The
Boers' last train left late Saturday
night. The Boer losses yesterday on
the west flank were 40 killed. Their
rear guard remains behind kopjes, 10
miles distant. Their is much railway
forage and corn here. It is stated
that the Boers are retreating towards
Kroonstad. The Zand River bridge
is reported to have been destroyed.

Latest From Mafeking.
London, May 8. — Lady Sarah Wil-
son wires from Mafeking, under date
of April 22, as follows:

"The situation is unchanged. The
garrison is depressed at there being
no sign of relief, but that he has ap-
pealed for permission to retire northward
from a crowning triumph on the western
border."

"A case of whiskey realized £108
at a raffie, and a pound of flour was
sold at auction for guineas."

Synapsis Getting Scarce.
London, May 8. — The Lorenzo Mar-
quez correspondent of The Times
says:

"Commandant Snyman is so alarm-
ed at the prospect of having his re-
treat cut off, that he has appealed
for permission to retire northward
from Mafeking to intercept Colonel
Plumer."

AN ELOQUENT TRIBUTE.
Description of the Canadian Troops on
the Occasion of Their Entry Into
the Free State Capital.

London, May 8. — The Morning
Standard correspondent, describing
the capture of Bloemfontein, refers to
the entry of the Canadians: "They
are fine, strapping fellows, broad-
shouldered, clean-limbed and blue-
eyed. They swing past with an easy
stride and a free gait, conscious of
the strength and pride brought them
from the lakes and mountains of
Canada. Their boots were out at the
toes, stockings undarned, breeches
torn, then mended and torn again,
but every tatter and every stain was
an honor to those sons from over
the sea, who have marched shoulder
to shoulder with regiments of long
and great tradition."

CANADIANS ILL.
Two Soldiers From Canada in a Serious
Condition at Cape Town.

London, May 8. — The War Office
has been notified by cable from
Cape Town that Private A. Therrault,
of the 9th Battalion, and in
Company, who was wounded in the
foot at Paardeberg, was seriously ill.
Private Agassiz, who went out
with the second contingent, is also
seriously ill.

Went Off to Canada.
London, May 8. — The Bloemfont-
ein correspondent of The Daily News
describing Greater Britain at the
front, says:

"To Canada we take off our hats.
She has sent us, besides other worthy
representatives, a regiment of infantry
that wins admiration from every
soldier for marching, endurance and
fighting. It can challenge compari-
son with any battalion in Lord
Roberts' army, and that is saying a
good deal."

A STICK WITH A STORY.

The Odd Ones Which It Performed
In a Gambling Den.

"There's an odd little story connect-
ed with this old cane," said a New
Orleans sporting man the other day.

excruciating agony, and he would im-
mediately lose all interest in exposing
fraud. While he was writhing and
groaning the old fellow would over-
whelm him with apologies and insist
