—Mr. Bart Cottam leaves next week for a trip to England.
—Chief of Police Vaughan, of Brantford, was in the city to-day.

—Mr. Frank Jewell, city, has left for a visit to Louisville, Ky.
—A great many people will get "a move on" within the next three weeks.

—B. E. Oiler, the well-known Toronto lawyer, is at the Tecumseh House.
—Dr. Hodge, Queen's avenue, continues to improve daily after his late illness.

—The bylaw to permit tax payment in three installments will not be operative before 1893.
—A likeness of Frank Kitchener, late of this city, adorns a page in this week's Police Gazette.

—The Young Liberals will hold another general rehearsal to-night. A full attendance is requested.
—John Wittingham, of Mount Clemens, who is on his way to London, was a lodger last night.—(Windsor Record.)

—The Board of Education will hold a special meeting this evening to let the contract for rebuilding Talbot street school.
—Dr. Wainwright, who has been seriously ill for some weeks, is now thought to be out of danger, and is slightly better to-day.

—Mr. R. Larmour has replied feelingly to the address which the G. T. R. staff in this city lately presented him together with \$500.
—George W. Morgan, proprietor of the cigar store in the Masonic Temple, has sold out to Louis Risk, late proprietor of the Grand Pacific Hotel.

—A Petrolol dispatch says: Fire broke out at the Imperial Oil Company's works last evening in the candle room. Loss about \$1,000; fully insured.
—Conclave of the West, K. S. F., holds an "at home" Thursday night. The London Knights of Sherwood Forest have been invited to be present.—(St. Thomas Journal.)

—The late Charles Glickmeyer, city clerk of Montreal, whose death has just been announced, was a brother of the late Mr. Glickmeyer, one of the pioneer merchants of this city.

—A dog frightened Milkman Horn's horses in South London yesterday afternoon, causing them to run away. The wagon was badly damaged and 150 quarts of milk were spilled.

—John Sullivan, late of the Tecumseh House, has joined in the exodus of young Canadians to the United States, having on Monday left for Chicago where he has secured a lucrative situation.

—James McPhail, of Wardsville, who was charged by the High School Board of this city with having embezzled \$700 of their funds, was yesterday discharged by Squire Peters, no evidence being offered.

—Mrs. Fax, of this city, was a sister of the late James Murray, the G. T. R. engineer, who was killed at Black Rock, N. Y., on Sunday. She died yesterday afternoon for his home in Fort Erie to attend the funeral.

—David Miller, high chief ranger of the L. O. F., is in the city today. A large number of new recruits are being reported monthly, and a constant increase of members is taking place in all the jurisdictions.

—Maurice Baldwin swept Richmond street last night with the new street sweeper. The engineer says he raked the instrument so much that he (the engineer) will not permit him to use it again. It is likely he will recommend that the contract be taken out of Baldwin's hands.

—Mr. Charles Hutchinson writes to the city complaining that the cellars on Wreay street, South London, have been all flooded with water. He says that a tile drain from that street is in need of carrying it away. The sewer is incapable of carrying it away. The solicitor says the city is not liable.

—The grievances of a general nature between the G. T. R. Company and its employees having been amicably arranged in Toronto, Messrs. T. C. Jones and J. Patterson, with Division Superintendent C. Stiff in this city to-day with a view to arrange matters of a specially local nature.

—Frank Becker, arrested before Judge Day this morning on a charge of attempted highway robbery, larceny and shopbreaking. He wished to write to an uncle in the States for money with which to adjust himself. He pleaded not guilty, and elected trial by a judge. The case was enlarged until April 21.

—Last evening the members of the Medical Society met in the office of Dr. MacArthur in the chair, and adjourned in consequence of the recent death of Dr. G. P. Jones, who was a member of the association. Before adjournment it was unanimously voted that the members of the society should attend in a body the funeral of their former associate.

—Mr. T. B. Parkinson, representative of Pigot & Bryan, painters and decorators of china, porcelain and granite, London, Ont., went over to Nanaimo yesterday. There are only two firms who do this painting and decorating of china, and Messrs. Pigot & Bryan have the distinction of being the only firm in the province to do so. He is a present which they sent in jubilee year having been accepted and acknowledged.

—A meeting of Loyal Star of the West Lodge, C. O. U. E., Manchester Unity, was held last evening. The secretary handed in the late Bro. Maxwell's regalia, presented to the lodge by Mrs. Maxwell for the kindness shown to her son. The lodge presented it to Bro. E. Parsons for the same manner in which he has held the office of secretary and attended to the duties of the committee. Bro. Parsons made a suitable reply. There will be three installations at the next meeting.

—Mrs. G. A. Smith, wife of the well-known pipe-major, who resides at 162 Cathcart street, died on Saturday morning after only a few hours' illness. What makes the circumstances still more sad is that Mr. Smith only returned on Friday from the funeral of Mrs. Smith's mother, who died at the farm in North Dumfries, where her sister now lies seriously ill. Mr. Smith is left with the care of seven small children, the youngest only a few hours old.—(Hamilton Herald.)

—Last night Right Wor. Bro. Robson, D. D. G. M., paid an official visit to Union Lodge, city, and witnessed the exemplification of the work by Wor. Bro. McMillan and his officers. The D. D. G. M. was attended by a large number of leading members of the craft, having city, including Very Wor. Bro. Clarke, grand superintendent of works; Wor. Bros. Paul, Skinner, McWhinney, Carothers, Brodie, ick, Norton, A. A. Campbell, A. C. Stewart, Bridge and John Stead. Among the visitors was Wor. Bro. Bennett, of Civil Service Lodge, Ottawa. At the close of the work the D. D. G. M. was congratulated on their work and the report on its prosperous condition. An hour or two was spent in social intercourse at the close of the ceremonies.

The Jewish Passover.
The Jewish Passover commenced last evening at sunset and will be observed for eight days. The first, second, seventh and eighth days of the festival are sacred, and upon those days services will be held in the synagogues at the same hour as on the Sabbath. During Passover all manner of leaven is prohibited. In the twelfth chapter of Exodus it is declared that the soul that partakes of leaven during the Passover shall be cut off, and, consequently, no leavened food is allowed. Under the head of leaven is included all malt liquors and all wines into whose composition any species of grain has entered. For domestic ceremonies raisin wine is generally used.

The report was full of interest and information concerning the Sunday school work, and the desire was expressed that more individual interest and responsibility be laid by the parents of the children. EGGS AT EASTER.
[From Harper's Bazar.]
The use of eggs for Easter can be traced, says Count de Goelein in his Religious History of the Calendar, to the theology and philosophy of the Egyptians, Persians, Gauls, Greeks, and Romans, among all of whom an egg was a symbol of universality, the "ark" of the supreme divinity. The Persians gave presents of eggs at the feast of the New Year—i.e., the feast of the vernal equinox—in honor of the renewal of all things. "The Egyptians held the egg a sacred emblem, the renovation of mankind after the deluge. The Jews adopted it to suit the circumstances of their history, as a type of their departure from Egypt, and it was used in the feast of the Passover as part of the furniture of the table with the paschal lamb." The early Druids used the egg in their ceremonies.

In Russia one man greets another on Easter with "Jesus Christ is risen." "Yes," he is risen," reply is made, and then the egg is given. In Moscow no meeting takes place without this salutation and exchange. "The meanest pauper in the street presenting an egg and repeating the words 'Christ is risen' may demand a salute even of the Empress." In some countries of Italy eggs are carried to the church to be blessed, and then taken home and set out with flowers on the table. Every visitor during Easter week is invited to eat an Easter egg, an invitation which must not be refused. Eggs in all countries are sent as tokens at this time, and enter into the sentiments and pastimes of old a young alike.

LONDON POLICE COURT.
Frank Becker, the tramp, committed for trial on a charge of Burglary.
Frank J. Bishop, of the hardware firm of J. Bishop & Son, of Brantford, laid an information before the police magistrate this morning charging Becker with burglary, committed in this city on March 27, for having firearms in his possession, with having broken into his store and stolen nine revolvers, 25 pocket knives and a safe key. Of the nine revolvers found on Becker, a number of them were identified as his. He produced empty boxes found in the store the morning after the burglary which contained the same make of knives and pocket knives. A number of razors found on the prisoner were identified as exactly like some kept in stock. Entrance was obtained to the store by breaking in a back window on the second floor. The magistrate committed Becker for trial.

Tim Sullivan, an 18-year-old boy who is frequently one of Chief Williams' guests, was remanded until next Monday on a charge of drunkenness and vagrancy. The charge against him was aggravated. There were four charges of non-payment of license fee against draymen. John Ackland said he had quit the business on April 8 and his case was allowed to stand. John McKay used the same court. The charges against The Yexex and Thea, Tough & Co. were withdrawn.
