Toronto, Ont., Sept. 18-11 p.m.—Since last

night a depression has traveled rapidly from

the north of Lake Superior to the Gulf of St.

Lawrence, attended by some heavy local thun-

der storms in the Ottawa and St. Lawrence

valleys. Thunder storms have also occurred

at a few places in the Lower Lake region.

The Northwest weather has been fine and

warm.

—Mr. John Ferguson, city, has been re-

appointed a member of the Examining

Board of the Ontario Undertakers' Asso-

ciation. He has also been placed on the

committee to secure legislation.

—Robert Adair was remanded until next

Wednesday at the Police Court yesterday

day on a charge of being drunk. In the

meantime an information charging him with

assault will likely be laid against him.

—The entertainment described as having

been given on Tuesday evening to the chil-

dren of the “South Mission,” took place at

the Hamilton Road Mission, which is con-

ducted by the Adelaide Street Baptist

Church.

—T. W. Scandrett, of this city, who has

been in the law office of Meredith, Cameron

& Judd, has passed his examinations as

solicitor and barrister. At the examina-

tion he stood among the first twelve

and not among the oral list, as announced

when the results were first published.

—Samuel Bloomgarden, John street, was

fined \$1 at the Police Court yesterday

for throwing a stick of wood and doing bodily

harm to the 6-year-old child of Elizabeth

Russell. He said that the five children of

the complainant had been annoying him,

but he did not intend to hit the child.

—There may be seen in R. Adcock's

butcher shop window, Richmond street,

a variety of large potatoes, the com-

bined weight of which is 95 pounds. They

were produced from two potatoes, and are

all eatable and of good size. Thirty-seven

of them weighed 44 pounds. They were

grown on the farm of Mr. Richard Bickley,

second concession, Westminster. The seed

was imported from Colorado and is called

the “New Windsor.”

Will the Spot Be Wiped Out?

It looks as if the “bleeding spot” at the

junction of Richmond street and Park

avenue will have to be erased. The idea

belongs to the city engineer, who proposed

to erect a fountain on a diamond-shaped

grass plot, and it was considered by the

Council a happy suggestion. Nearly all

the work on it has been finished, and the

solicitor was asked if it were legitimate

to put on the finishing touches—a low house-

ward fence. This is his answer: “I know

of no authority which the city has to make

such a way as that accidents might

happen to persons driving or walking, it

would involve the city in expensive litigation.

I would therefore advise that the

road be blockaded and that no park be

laid out there unless no fence erected.” The

Board of Works Thursday referred it to

the Council. The engineer will proceed to

blockade between the street car tracks on

Richmond street, the solicitor holding that

the city was liable for the work. The

Street Railway Company must keep it in

good order. The solicitor informed the

committee at Mr. Moylan, of Dundas

street, had served him with a notice of

action, alleging damage to his property by

the raising of the street. Aldermen Connor

and Shaw and the engineer will look into

the matter. The 25 or so applications for

the position of caretaker at Queen's Park

were laid over.
