Series of Successful Dairy Meetings Held in Essex.

Point Edward Methodists Invite Rev. J. G. Fallis to Continue His Pastorate.

The population of Chatham is now placed at 3,900.
William Peters, a prominent Walker-ville Freeman, died Tuesday.
The wife of the Rev. Dr. Ure, of Goderich, is dead. She was in her 76th year.

Owing to the prevalence of measles and mumps at Essex the public schools are kept empty.
Bois Blanc Island is overrun with rats and Manager Robertson is advertising for 25 cats.

John Waterhouse's woolen mill at Tilsburg was sold recently to a Mr. Brown at that place for \$2,000.

Letters patent have been issued to the Brown-Wigle Woolen Company, of Kingsville, capital stock \$100,000.

Mrs. Dangerfield, relict of the late Thos. Dangerfield, died at her residence, South of Sparta, early Saturday morning.

Mrs. Cameron, of Woodstock, mother of Hon. J. D. Cameron, of Manitoba, is seriously ill. Mr. Cameron has been called to her bedside.

The Walkerville Council will erect a memorial fountain in that town in commemoration of the diamond jubilee of Queen Victoria.

The Chatham police commissioners have ordered that the sale of Sunday newspapers and the riding of cyclists on sidewalks be stopped.

The combined choir of the Episcopalian Churches of Windsor, Walkerville, and Sandwich will give a concert in a few days in aid of their libraries.

The quarterly board of the Methodist Church in Point Edward gave Rev. J. G. Fallis a unanimous invitation to continue as their pastor for a fourth year.

A petition is being circulated in Berlin in opposition to the sale of the Bell Telephone Co., that they be empowered to increase their scale of charges.

It is the intention to take Detective Mahoney back to Windsor from Chatham as soon as possible, as he developed malaria recently from drinking the water.

John Lovegrove, who has been caretaker of the Government buildings at Amherstburg ever since they were erected, has been notified of his discharge from the service. The salary is \$400 per year.

The long-standing lawsuits between Col. Atkinson and James A. Randall, of Detroit, have been decided in favor of Atkinson by the Canadian courts of appeal. The dispute was over some property on Bois Blanc Island.

A gasoline stove at the residence of Mrs. Col. Smith, East street, Chatham, exploded Tuesday, and an ugly fire was imminent, but prompt measures taken by the inmates of the house put out the blaze before the firemen arrived.

Nearly 15,000 pounds of milk were brought into Murray's cheese factory, con. 10, East Nissouri, on Monday, from which seventeen cheeses were made, averaging 75 to 80 lbs. each. There is a promise of a big make at the factory this season.

At Shakespeare, on Tuesday, Norman, the 1-year-old son of Alvin MacDonald, while playing about a bonfire in the garden, got his clothes ignited. His screams brought his parents to the rescue, who smothered the flames, but not before he was badly burned. He will likely recover.

Henry Robinson, of Windsor, convicted of non-support, has secured a new trial. He wanted to put in evidence that before they were married he agreed that each was to live at home just as before. Judge Ferguson would not admit this evidence, and the case was ordered to go to a new trial.

In Amour vs. Town of Ingersoll—Judgment on appeal. The plaintiff, from judgment of Street, J., in favor of plaintiff for \$900 in action for damages for injury to property sustained by the plaintiff from the defendant's negligence in allowing the ice and snow on the sidewalk on Thames street, to fall on the plaintiff's horse, was allowed. Appeal allowed.

Appellants contended that plaintiff was guilty of contributory negligence, and failed upon 57 Vic. (O.), ch. 30, section 13. Appeal dismissed with costs.

Many will regret to learn of the death of Janet Jamieson, relict of the late Thomas Jamieson, of Kirkwall, which occurred on Saturday morning. The deceased was born in Scotland 36 years ago. In 1852 she came to Canada, with her parents, who settled on the farm near Kirkwall, now owned by Wm. Dickson. There she married her husband, who pre-deceased her some 12 years. Of her children, two sons and one daughter survive: William, Clyde, Robert, on the homestead, and Mrs. McMillan, Ayr.

A series of dairy meetings in Essex County, attended by Prof. Dean, of the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph. They were arranged by Mr. J. A. Auld, P.P., the active member of this riding, and were held under the auspices of Superintendent Hodson, of the Farmers' Institutes. Very successful meetings were held at the Essex Union factory and the Malden town hall on Thursday, at Cottam on Friday and at Hartley on Saturday. At Osgoode Hall, Bicknell vs. Peterson—Judgment on appeal by plaintiff from judgment of Falconbridge, J., who tried the action at Sarnia, dismissing it with costs. The action was brought to restrain the infringement of a patent, and for damages. The learned judge held that the alleged invention was not patentable. Appeal allowed with costs, and judgment to be entered for plaintiff for an injunction and damages with costs.

LEGAL DECISIONS

In the Case of Bain Vs. Anderson and Other Interesting Cases.

The following cases came up at Osgoode Hall yesterday:

Bain vs. Anderson—Judgment on appeal by defendants from judgment of Meredith, C. J. (27 O. R. 369), in favor of plaintiff in an action for the wrongful dismissal of plaintiff from the service of the defendants as the superintendent of their furniture factory. The plaintiff had been for many years in the employment of the James Bay Company as superintendent at a salary of \$1,500 a year, and was under an engagement with that company for a year ending July 31, 1895, when, on May 18, 1895, he was employed by the defendant Anderson.

On that day the defendants gave him notice that after the expiration of Saturday his salary would be reduced to \$1,000 per year, and that he was to be considered a hiring for a year, and whether it was terminable by written notice or not, both of which conditions of fact and of law, no reasonable notice had been given in this case, and his dismissal was wrongful, and he was entitled to recover such damages as he had sustained by reason of it, which damages were assessed at \$400.36, being wages at the rate of \$1,500 a year from Aug. 23, 1895, to Dec. 1 following, when the plaintiff began business on his own account. The majority of the court were of opinion that there was no yearly hiring, but plaintiff was under temporary arrangement with either he or defendant might terminate at any time. Ostr. J. A. dissented, holding that there was evidence upon which the court could reasonably find a yearly hiring. Appeal allowed with costs. McCarthy, J. dissented.

Robinson vs. Dun—Judgment on appeal by R. G. Dun & Co., the defendants, from judgment of Boyd, C. J. (O. R. 21), in favor of plaintiff in action of libel tried with a jury at London. The defendants contended that the plaintiff had been libeled by a newspaper, and that the newspaper was liable for the damages. The court found in favor of the plaintiff, and judgment was given for the plaintiff.
