Heavy Shipment of Wool and Lumber to the United States.

Marked Falling Off in the Number of Failures.

There has been a moderate trade in the province of Ontario, but shipments of wool and lumber to the United States continue heavy. Bank clearings at Winnipeg, Hamilton, Toronto, Montreal and Halifax amount to \$18,000,000 this week, against \$16,989,000 last week, and as compared with \$13,964,000 one year ago.

There have been 1,074 business failures reported from the Dominion of Canada during the past six months. 110 less than in the first half of last year, the aggregate liabilities amounting to \$7,618,000—a decrease of about per cent. There are 32 fewer failure in the province of Ontario, and 85 fewer in Quebec, but liabilities of failing traders in the former show a slight in crease, while those in the latter indicate a moderate decrease compared with the corresponding period last year Dun & Co.'s review says: Canadian change, though encouraging features appear at different points.

Yellow Fever on Board

Terrible Experience of Passengers on Board the Steamer Para.

A Dozen Die With Yellow Fever and Are Buried at Sea.
