Spokane, Wash., July 14.—The best information obtainable here to-day is to the effect that reports of a massacre at Old Mission were greatly exaggerated, only one man being killed, and he accidentally.

Wallack, Idaho, July 14.—The situation remains quiet. All the miners went home to the various mines last night. The Poor Man and Tiger mines, which have been deserted since Monday, started up again this morning, also the Mammoth and Custer mines. Work at the Morning and Hunter mines was also reaumed this morning. A ripple of excitement was created last night among the remaining miners when it was learned that the Granite mine force had not left. A delegation of miners immediately started for the mine, four miles from Wallace, and brought the non-union men down. They were ordered out of Cour d'Alene. The miners declare Delashmutt and McAulay agreed to discharge the men and had not done so. They are the last non-union men in Cour d'Alene. It is said they will leave to-morrow.

President Carnot, who inspected the troops, received an evation.

Robbing the Wreck. A quantity of bottled beer and tools were stolen. A salvage steamer yesterday succeded in saving a large quantity of provisions, rope, chain cable and other articles.

Mount Ætna Means Business.

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Rome, July 14.—Mount Ætna has eighteen openings, nine of which are active. The lava is flowing in the direction of Nicolosi at the rate of 50 yards an hour. It has already passed the lava deposits formed by the violent eruption of 1886. A Gritty Princess.

VIENNA, July 14.—The story is going the rounds, and is pretty generally accepted as true, that at the time Prince Pismarck paid his memorable visit to Vienna, Prince Reuss, the German ambassador, did not see fit to literally obey the Kaiser's suggestion to absent himself from the Austrian capital. The Princess Reuss not only went further and saw the ex-Chancellor, but she declared that she and her entourage would not obey the spirit even if they did the letter of the orders from Berlin, and therefore she was glad to see him, and she would not hesitate to tell him so. She added that she was the daughter of a sovereign prince, the Duke of Saxe-Weimar, and she would not allow the Berlin council to order her about.

Terrible Riot in Sartoff.

Madrid, July 14.—The report of the Spanish medical commission, sent to Paris to inquire into the nature of the epidemi

to inquire into the nature of the epidemic of the so-called cholerine, has been received. The report declares that the disease is the Asiatic cholera. In consequence of this report the Government has ordered that precautions be immediately taken along the Pyreneean frontier to prevent the introduction of the disease into Spain.

PETERSBURG, July 14.-Since the last dispatch twenty new cases of cholera and eleven deaths from the disease have been reported at Simbirsk on the Volga

River.

St. Petersburg, July 14.—An official cholera report issued to-day shows that on July 8 and 9 there were 459 new cases of the disease and 139 deaths throughout all the Russian districts affected. The heaviest mortality at any single, place was at Baku, where there were 62 deaths. While there were 191 new cases in Astrakhan, there were only 32 deaths there. All the private schools in the Caucasus will be closed owing to the prevalence of cholera. Black smallpox is epidemic among the troops in the great camp at Kraskoe-Szelo, eighteen miles southeast of St. Petersburg.

He is to give particular attention to the study of the glacers of this region, and also will make researches with regard to codiish in the neighboring waters. This fish does not wander by chance through the sea, but is developed and thrives only under certain biological conditions, the most important of which relates to the temperature and the presence of the crustacea which serve as its food.
