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The Conflict Will Continue

Gen. Miles Heads an Expedition for Porto Rico.

Details Perfected and the Troops Under Way.

Expected to Reach the Point of Landing on Wednesday Night.

Sampson's Fleet Will Co-operate with the Army in the Movement Against Porto Rico—Watson's Squadron To Be Soon Ready for a Raid on Spain.

Washington, July 19.—After three days' consultation between the president, Secretary Alger and Gen. Brooke, during which there was frequent communication with Gen. Miles at Siboney, the details of the Porto Rican expedition were perfected, and the expedition itself was gotten under way.

Gen. Miles, with some artillery and troops, sailing yesterday for Porto Rico on the cruiser Yale, to be followed quickly by an army of about 30,000 men.

First, there will be practically no naval convoys; the navy department has declared that they are unnecessary; that there is not a Spanish warship in the West Indies, that dare thrust its bow out of port. In the second place, the expedition does not start from one point, but will be divided among several ports, thus preventing the tremendous congestion that was encountered at Manila. Lastly, there will be no effort made to get the ships away together, but the transports will be allowed to find their own way to their destinations without concert of movement.

GEN. MILES LEADS THE WAY. He has been promised by the president that he should go to Porto Rico, and the promise was redeemed when the Yale headed for Siboney for Porto Rico, 800 miles distant. Gen. Miles' command and upon him will rest the responsibility for the execution of the details of the expedition.

It is estimated that Gen. Miles should arrive by Wednesday night at the point selected for the landing, and that the first division of the first army corps, and are commanded by Brig. Gen. George H. Ernst. The brigade comprises the Sixth Wisconsin, Third Wisconsin and Sixteenth Pennsylvania Regiments.

The Navy in It. BOMBARDMENT OF SAN JUAN. The part which the navy is to take in the assault against Porto Rico has been fully matured. The several transport fleets will have with them one or two auxiliary craft carrying strong secondary batteries of six or eight pounders. No time has been fixed for the departure of Admiral Sampson's fleet for San Juan. As to the navy, they will co-operate in every way with the movements of the army. It is the general understanding, however, that the navy will rely mainly on armored ships for the bombardment of San Juan, as the big battleships and monitors afford the best means of offensive warfare, while their armor belts protect them from such fire as the San Juan batteries can bring to bear. BEGIN AT ONCE. and it is probable that some of Admiral Sampson's ships proceeded with Gen. Miles' first expedition toward Porto Rico. They will be needed to cover the debarkation of the troops on shore as soon as the full army expedition is ready to make a landing, when the attack will begin simultaneously from land and sea.

UNITED STATES TARIFF AT SANTIAGO. Washington, July 19.—The tariff for Santiago was signed by President McKinley after a brief conference late yesterday afternoon with Secretaries Gage and Alger. The instructions were immediately cable to the authorities in charge of San Juan, so that the tariff can be put in force today.

SHORT AND DECISIVE. Washington, July 19.—The purpose of Secretary Alger is to make the Porto Rican campaign a short one. An overwhelming force will be thrown upon the island, and it is possible that a bloodless victory will be achieved when the Spanish become convinced that they have no reasonable chance to resist successfully.

The expedition is to comprise 30,000 men at the start, and it will be soon swelled to 40,000 men, and, if necessary, to 70,000 men, the equipment of the volunteer forces having now progressed so well as to warrant the statement that that number of men can be ready for service in Porto Rico within a very short time. The entire body of troops at Tampa will be taken, numbering about 13,000 men, and including a lot of heavy and light artillery, under command of General Rodgers. The expedition will be particularly strong with artillery.

It has been finally decided that none of the troops participating in the actual fighting shall be employed on the Porto Rican expedition. There are two reasons for this. First, the men have suffered severely, and are entitled to a rest. Second, it is deemed to be very bad practice to allow the soldiers who have been exposed to yellow fever to be brought in contact with those fresh from the United States.

RIGHT OFF. Gen. Miles' force which left Siboney, Col., yesterday on the Yale, comprised four batteries of artillery and a few seasoned troops. Two brigades now at Charleston, are embarking on transports to take them to Porto Rico. All the force at Tampa, 13,000 strong, are bracing artillery, will be put aboard ship as rapidly as transports can be gotten there, and sent to reinforce the first and second divisions of his corps from Chickamauga to Porto Rico. Gen. Brooke left here yesterday afternoon for Chickamauga to get his troops started.

INVASION OF SPAIN. Washington, July 19.—The plans for sending Commodore Watson's eastern squadron to Spain have reached a point where naval officers are considering the exact day of departure, and it is said that positive orders have been given that preparations must be brought to a close at once with a view of having everything in readiness by the end of this week.

HAILED DOWN THE SPANISH CAULP McCulla, July 18, via Playa del Este, Guantanamo Bay, July 19.—A launch from the Marblehead went up the bay this afternoon, and gave formal notice to the Spanish commander of the surrender of Gen. Toral's troops, together with the conditions of the capitulation of Santiago. The American officer also gave notice that if the Spanish gunboat Sandovál was destroyed in any way, or if any arms, ammunition, public buildings or barracks at Caimanera or Guantanamo were destroyed, the Spaniards would not be treated as prisoners of war. The flag was hauled down this afternoon. From Spanish sources it is learned that the garrison at Guantanamo and Caimanera is about 5,000, of which number, however, 2,000 are disabled by sickness or wounded.

At Manila. DEWEY'S MESSAGE TO THE GERMAN ADMIRAL. New York, July 19.—A dispatch to the World from Manila, July 19, by way of Hong Kong, China, says: Admiral Dewey sent a messenger to the German admiral recently to inquire whether America and Germany are at peace or at war. If they are at peace he demands that the German warships here pursue a different course. If they are at war he wanted to know it, so he could govern himself accordingly. Admiral Dewey was prompted to send this peremptory message by the action of the German cruiser Irene in preventing an insurgent attack upon the Spanish garrison at Subig Bay, which greatly displeased him.

Admiral Von Diederichs, in command of the German fleet in the Pacific, returned a verbal answer, apologetic in tone and satisfactory. But afterward he sent to Admiral Dewey a note, stating that he objected to the Americans stopping German ships which have been in the bay once and been visited. The German ships have made a practice of coming into Manila and then making trips outside the bay, cruising among the islands and returning in two or three days. The German contention is that a ship should not be stopped after the first time.

Admiral Dewey replied that Manila is a blockaded port and that he would continue to have all ships communicated with when he desired, still on the first or the hundredth time of entering the bay.

The German admiral responded, still objecting, and saying that he would submit the question to the senior officers of his other warships.

The Germans continue to keep a large squadron of warships in the bay and about the islands. The armored cruiser Kaiser and the protected cruiser Irene have remained at Manila. The protected cruisers Kalstein, Augusta,
