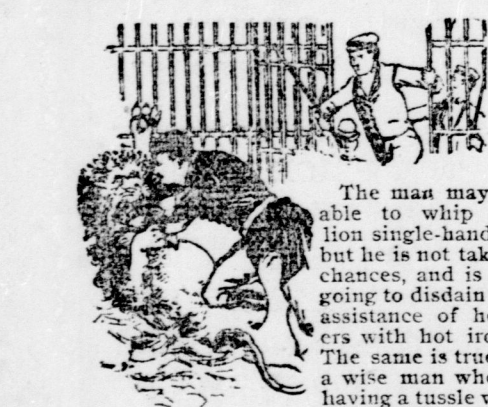

The game was well contested, and furnished good entertainment. It was not otherwise marred by umpire England's decisions. Chatham was in the lead up to the seventh, when London secured two, tied by adding one in the sixth, and won out on a bad error by Conklin in the ninth. England's umpiring was very unsatisfactory, he virtually winning the game for London by some of the rankest decisions ever seen on the grounds. Owing to his work, the Chatham manager, agent, has refused to play under his ruling, and a player from each team umpire tomorrow.
