A Mining Horror.

Fifty Killed or Injured in Waldenburg-Seventeen Others Missing.

Breslau, Dec. 31.-A terrible disaster has occurred at Waldenburg, Prussian Silesia, 43 miles southwest of this city. An explosion of fire damp took place this morning in the Wrangel colliery, near Waldenburg. Fifty persons are known to have been killed or injured by the explosion, and seventeen others are missing. Twenty-one bodies have already been recovered and twelve of the injured miners have been brought to the surface of the mine. The work of recovering the bodies of the others is progressing, and everything possible is being done for the injured. There are the usual heartrending scenes at the mouth of the pit, where the relatives of the killed or injured miners are gathered with many hundreds of other people.

FOUND DEAD.

Windsor, Ont., Dec. 31.-Dr. E. Brooke was found dead yesterday morning in a room adjoining his office in the Bell block, Onnetelle avenue. He resided at the Manning House, but had not been there during Sunday, and as he did not appear yesterday morning his friends began to suspect something was wrong, and a search was made with the above result. The cause of death is supposed to have been a rupture of a blood vessel. The doctor was very quiet and unassuming in his manner, and he made a host of friends here during the few years of his practice. His parents will come from Chatham to take charge of his body. The deceased was 35 years of age and single. He was a physician for the Grand Trunk and Michigan Central, and a member of the Freemasons, Ancient Order of United Workmen and Knights of Pythias.

Russia Ready

To Pounce on Corea for Assaults on the Czar's Subjects.

The Ashantee Expedition Has Reached the Enemy's Lines.

Generally Wretched Condition of the Turkish Troops.

Lord and Lady Aberdeen Congratulate the G. O. M. on His 86th Birthday.

THE YOUNG DUCHESS ILL.

London, Dec. 31.-The young Duchess of Marlborough (nee Miss Consuelo Vanderbilt), is very ill in Rome with typhoid fever, a private letter received from there today announces. The fever was contracted while she was in Spain.

ABERDEEN AND THE G. O. M.

London, Dec. 31.-A dispatch from Biarritz says: Among the thousands of congratulatory messages received by Mr. Gladstone on the occasion of his 86th birthday, which occurred Sunday, was a telegram from Lord and Lady Aberdeen at Ottawa.

THE CORRESPONDENT'S ASSERTION.

Vienna, Dec. 31.-The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Neue Freie Presse telegraphs that Russia and France have actually promised diplomatic support of the United States in the Venezuelan trouble, and he adds that Russia is prepared to facilitate the United States loan with her own gold reserve.

IN COREA.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 31.-A dispatch to the Nove Vremya from Vladivostok says that the situation of affairs in Corea is most serious. The King is constantly surrounded by Japanese spies, and he fears that he will be assassinated. The dispatch adds that his Majesty is guarded nightly by the American missionaries.

RUSSIA READY.

London, Dec. 31.-A dispatch from Shanghai says it is reported in that city that Russia is massing troops on the Korean frontier in readiness for any emergency that may arise. Owing to alleged assaults on Russian subjects in Corea 70 Russian officers and soldiers have arrived at Gonsan, on the east coast of Corea.

RETREAT OF THE CUBANS.

Madrid, Dec. 31.-A dispatch to the Impartial from Havana under today's date says that the main army of the insurgents is retreating before Spanish forces. A later dispatch from Havana says that the main insurgent army has crossed the Hanabana River, re-entering the Province of Santa Clara at a point a short distance north of Cienega Oriental de Sepata. Gen. Martin, in command of a strong force, has started from the city of Santa Clara to intercept the insurgents on their retreat eastward.

MRS. OLIPHANT'S PROTEST.

London, Dec. 31.-Mrs. Oliphant's vehement and outspoken attack in the January issue of Blackwood on Hardy's latest novel, Grant Allen's latter day books, and the whole school of imitators, whom she describes as the Anti-Marriage League, is distinctively the literary event of the season. She is the oldest of the British novelists, with perhaps a larger record of honorable, painstaking, good work behind her than any other writer in our language, and she has never been given to scolding or to saying unpleasant things. This frankly scathing onslaught, therefore, comes with a peculiar force, and everybody is talking about it.

UNCLE SAM BORROWING \$200,000,000.

London, Dec. 31.-It is reported that a syndicate is being formed in Berlin and London to take up the proposed United States loan.

The principal negotiations will be held in Berlin for 4 per cent bonds issued at about par. The London firms taking part in the syndicate include the prominent American bankers here. It is doubtful whether a public issue will be made by the syndicate, all depending upon the view which President Cleveland may take about the issue price. The amount proposed to be taken is \$200,000,000. A. proposed to be taken in the Main dispatch says: An American loan of \$150,000,000, at 3 per cent, is about to be negotiated here by the Morgans and the Deutsche Bank group.

THE ASHANTEE EXPEDITION.

London, Dec. 31.-The main body of the Ashantee expeditionary force left Cape Coast Saturday, and the advance guard has already reached the River Pra, which has been bridged. When this work was accomplished the scouting parties were sent forward into the enemy's country, and news of conflicts with the forces of the King of Ashantee may be expected at any moment. The malarial fevers, which are most dreaded, have not made themselves felt to any extent. Only a few soldiers, chiefly West Indians, have been affected, and only one died from their effects. King Premph has sent several temporizing messages to the British authorities, but no notice has been taken of them, and it is generally believed that he will fight when the expedition enters the bush. Gen. Sir Francis Scott, inspector-general of the Gold Coast forces, accompanied by his staff, which includes Prince Henry of Battenberg and Prince Christian Victor of Schleswig-Holstein, started for the front Saturday.

WRETCHED STATE OF THE TURKISH ARMY.

The Daily News prints a dispatch from its Constantinople correspondent saying that the Turkish soldiers who are investing Zeitoun are suffering terribly from the cold. On an average of 50 deaths from exposure occur daily among the troops. The condition of the army everywhere, except that portion stationed in Constantinople, is deplorable. The men have not received pay for many months. Their clothing is tattered and their food is poor and inadequate. The 60,000 troops serving in Syria are being decimated by disease, and numbers of the reserves are daily deserting, taking their arms and

ammunition with them. This means that these deserters will take to brigandage in the near future. All the Christian gendarmes in Asia Minor have resigned, owing to the fact that they have not been paid.

The Times publishes a dispatch from Constantinople stating that the Armenian insurgents at Zeitoun have been reinforced by 500 men from Gium, and that they have taken new positions of defense. Dragomans from six embassies went to the Porte Saturday and offered to negotiate with the insurgents to bring about the capitulation of Zeitoun.

TURKISH LIES.

London, Dec. 30.-A correspondent at Constantinople telegraphs under date of Dec. 28: The continuous publication and circulation of official falsehoods, together with the barricade against truth of every avenue of publicity, has assumed the most dangerous proportions here. Censorship of the Turkish press exists. Late-ly its sole object has been to suppress facts and to compel the publication of "editorials" relative to the Armenians which are prepared at the palace and of "telegrams" written under physical compulsion by wretched Armenian prisoners in the dungeons of Asiatic Turkey. In reality, the Turkish newspapers are thus edited at the palace. The result of this use of the press is that the Mohammedan populace and even moderately educated gentlemen at Constantinople find their chief reason for discontent with the Sultan in his failure to order the destruction of Christians generally. They suppose that the Armenians of Asiatic Turkey have murdered and pillaged great numbers of Moslems; that the reserves have been called out to order the Armenians; that the Europeans have intervened to prevent the restoration of order, and that the foreign gunboats have come to the Bosphorus in order to encourage Christians to insurrection. The deductions made from this mass of error is that the Christians are preparing to massacre Moslems, and therefore the Moslems must first massacre the Christians.

CABLE NOTES.

A dispatch received at Berlin from Swatow, Province of Quang-Tong, China, says that the ringleaders of the mob which plundered the German missions at Moilin have been beheaded.

A Melbourne dispatch to the Times says that a shipment of 1,000 tons of California wheat has arrived at Sydney. The stock of old Victorian wheat, together with the orders already placed in California, will cover the net deficiency for Australia.

The Glasgow ship-builders have virtually completed their arrangements for resuming operations with non-union men, who will work under Government protection.

Princess Frederick Leopold, while skating on the ice near Berlin, broke through, and had a very narrow escape from being drowned.
