Will of the Late Mr. Kiely.

The following are the main features in

the will of the late George W. Kiely. The

total value of the estate has not yet been

ascertained. To Mrs. Kiely, widow of de-

ceased, the sum of \$10,000 a year during

lifetime is left. The residence on Jarvis

street, including furniture, horses, car-

riages, etc., are also bequeathed to her for

life. A liberal annual allowance is left for

the maintenance of deceased's six infant

children.

The charitable bequests amount in all to

\$17,000. Of this amount the sum of \$10,000

is left in the hands of certain persons who

are to dispose of it in such charities as

they deem most to require it. The other

charitable bequests are: To the Sunnyside

Orphanage, \$1,000; House of Providence,

\$1,000; Monastery of the Precious Blood,

\$1,000; Boys' Home, \$1,000; Girls' Home,

\$1,000; Home for Incurables, \$1,000, and

the Haven, Weston street, \$1,000.

The will directs that the following

annuities for life be paid: To the brothers

of deceased, Morris and John D. Kiely,

\$400; to the brother Francis M., \$300; to

the brother-in-law, William Smyth, \$300;

to deceased sister, Mrs. Harriet O'Leary,

—The use of artificial stone for side-

hardens. There is a great difference in

A Book by Rev. G. L. Mackay.

Addresses on "The Church at Home"

and on "Mission Work in Formosa," de-

livered by Rev. G. L. Mackay, missionary

at Tientsin, Formosa, have just been printed

in pamphlet form, and will be found very

interesting reading. In the story of his

labors amongst the Chinese, Dr. Mackay

describes the dangers to which he was ex-

posed at the hands of the natives, who at

first were bitterly hostile to his work. The

pamphlet is illustrated with sketches of

Dr. Mackay and his Chinese wife and chil-

dren in the native costume, and views of

the church and educational institutions.

Drowned at Port Stanley.

A sad drowning accident occurred at

Port Stanley at 4 o'clock yesterday after-

noon when Mr. Wm. Balkwill, son of Isaac

Balkwill, aged 21 years, lost his life. He

was stepping from the dock to a scow

when he missed his footing and fell into

the harbor between the scow and the dock

and never came up. Willing hands at once

dived after him, the water being twelve

feet deep and muddy, but they could not

locate him until grappling irons were

brought into use, and it was fully 40

minutes before the body was recovered.

Every means was used to resuscitate him,

but they failed, and after 40 minutes Dr.

Gault, of St. Thomas, who happened to

be on the heights, arrived and pronounced

him dead.
