Mustill, president Buffalo association; Wm. Keiller, Toronto; Thomas Brown, De-troit; J. W. Bowen, Chicago; S. Mol-land, Chicago; Frank Plant, Ottawa; F. A. Wilson, Buffalo; J. H. McConnell, Windsor; C. J. Wall, Windsor; John D. Macpherson, Detroit; J. W. Burriss, Detroit; J. Fred Jennings, Detroit; Col. Charles Stone, Toronto; C. D. Mac pherson, Chicago; H. Lancaster, Omaha; T. G. Winnett, Bay City; E. E. Wilson, Detroit; W. J. Fox, Chicago;

G. O. Weston, Chicago. A letter from J. Fred Cryer, New York, notified the committee that an association had been formed in that city in July.

There are now eleven associations affillated with the central body. The only new association since the meeting in June is Buffalo.

The treasurer's report showed re-ceipts of \$70 and disbursements of \$63 19. The report was adopted. An Interesting Decision Rendered Regarding Trades Unions.

London, Aug. 6.-The House Lords yesterday rendered an important judgment affecting trades unions. The case was brought up on appeal from the judgment of the Irish courts, awarding a wholesale butcher damages against the Butchers' Assistants' Association, which brought pressure to bear on retailers to boycott the plaintiff until he dismissed a certain nonunion employe, threatening otherwise to call out the union employes of the firms concerned, and finally it induced the non-unionist to leave the plaintiff. The Lords dismissed the appeal, on the ground that the acts of wrongful and malicious conspiracy were not undertaken to advance the interests of the workmen themselves, but solely to injure the plaintiff.

other constituent companies of the United States Steel Corporation, President Shaffer has sent a similar notice to the officers of the Federal Steel Company, giving them the same time in which to make any effort they may desire to bring about a settlement, or he will put in force this same clause in the Amalgamated Association constitution. It is presumed that the delay in issuing the general order will be at least until the end of the present week. Possibly it will not be issued until early next week. In the meantime the men in the mills of these three companies will be prepared to come out when the strike order is is-

The possibility of a settlement of the strike is based on the bare hope that officials of three additional companies will bring to bear sufficient influence to urge an adjustment of the difficulties before the strike order is issued. President Shaffer did not express any hope that this would be
