MR. DOUGLAS STOREY.

Mr. Douglas Storey, though quite a young man, has traveled extensively. He was for three years editor of the Standard and Digger News, Johannesburg, three years of the stormiest political times that the Transvaal has seen. He was at length put across the border for wounding Boer susceptibilities in his paper. After eighteen months at home he returned to South Africa for the purpose of accompanying the Boer forces in the interest of the London Daily Mail. Few publicists know South Africa better than Mr. Storey. His present headquarters are New York. Talking with Mr. Storey, he said, in substance: "One should, indeed, confess himself a dull observer, did not the atmosphere of an unfamiliar country impress itself upon him in the course of a journey of five thousand miles. In Canada, from the Atlantic Ocean to the Pacific coast, we have breathed the air of a free country, a country that has within it all the elements of an empire, all the essentials of a nation. Since the landing of H. R. H. the Duke of Cornwall, Canada has proclaimed her loyalty enthusiastically, whole-heartedly. But what has impressed me most in her welcome has been its manly self-respect. Nowhere has the enthusiasm of her reception degenerated into subserviency. She remembered she is a colony, not a 2-pendency, a country peopled with men of a like intelligence to the men of the mother country, governed by men of an equal education, a similar knowledge of affairs. In this lies the strength of Canada, the greatness of the British Empire. There are colonies that clutch fearfully to the Union Jack, that tremble if they find themselves for a moment loosened by the exigencies of their own development from its familiar support. 

### ANARCHY PREVAILS

Men Sandbagged and Robbed in Broad Daylight.

Thousands Who Went There Are Leaving-A Severe Storm-Winter Communication by Stages.

Port Townsend, Wash., Oct. 14.-Reoorts from Nome, brought down Saturday by the steamer John S. Kimball state that a reign of terror prevails a Nome. Holdups and robberies are of nightly occurrence. Men are being sandbagged and robbed in broad day light when caught in lonely places Sluice-box robberies are frequent and several mines have been robbed of from \$500 to \$2,000. Business houses have been entered, and even women walking on the streets are made vic-tims. On Sept. 29 two masked men entered the store of Mrs. S. M. Hovey and at the point of a pistol forced her

to give up \$500. WINTER TRAVEL.

Nome will have winter communication with the outside world by means of a stage line. Norman R. Smith, who is at the head of the stage company, recently arrived at Nome, bringing with him 50 horses and a large number of dogs. He proposes during the winter to run stages from Nome to Illiauma Bay, a distance of 800 miles, carrying passengers, mail and express. Along the route there will be 35 relay stations. Illiauma Bay can be reached by steamers during the entire winter.

SEVERE STORM. Nome was again visited by a severe storm, which commenced on the night of Sept. 26, and continued for three days with increasing fury. As a result every lighter that was anchored off Nome and the government tug, Capt.

Warden, is on the beach. The only loss of life as a result of the storm thus far reported occurred while the storm was abating. The schooner Abbie Deering sailed in and Capt. George Stevens, of the schooner Prosper, which was wrecked at Cape Lisburne, on Aug. 26, and a man named Tracey Robertson attempted to go ashore in a small boat. The boat capsized and both were drowned. EXODUS FROM NOME.

Seattle, Wash., Oct. 14.-Statistics carefully compiled disclose that 9,000 people went to Nome this season, and that 10,200 have returned or are returning, leaving about 4,000 in the district for the winter.

There were 80 vessels, steam and sail, engaged in the traffic, carrying from this city 55,000 tons of general

#### THE WORLD'S WHEAT

or 1900.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 14.-The department of agriculture announces that the three most important estimates of the world's wheat crop of 1891 district. Their feet swell and then so far made agree that the crop is burst. So far no remedy has been larger than that of the crop of either of the preceding years. The estimate follows: Hungarian ministry of agriculture, 2,761,330,000 bushels, 60 rounds; Beerbohm's corn list of London, 2,711,-600,000 bushels of 60 pounds; and Bulletin des Halles of Paris, 2,790,310,000 Winchester bushels. Our department withholds its opinion as to the de-gree in which the world's crop has been approximated in any of these estimates until a considerably larger number of official returns is available. The official Hungarian estimate says the crop exceeds last year's by 209,-881,000 boshels of 60 pounds, or by 21,-430,000 Winchester bushels. According to Beerbohm, the excess over last year's crop is 200,200,000 bushels of 60 pounds, and according to the Bulletin les Halles the excess is 113,777,000 Winchester bushels. The principal inrease is credited to the United States, Canada and India, though various other countries are considered with larger crops than they had in 1900.
