## KING STREET CHURCH WANTS

REV. THOS. WILSON TO STAY

Congregation Votes Unanimously to Oppose Acceptance of His Resignation.

A mass meeting of the congregation of the King Street Presbyterian Church was held last night in the school room to consider whether the resignation of their pastor, Rev. Mr. Wilson, would be accepted. Mr. C. L. Doolittle was in the chair.

Mr. William F. Connor, the appointee of the session to go before the synod, was the first speaker. "If you do not appoint a deputation, the resignation will likely be accepted by default," said he. "The way I feel on the matter is that if Mr. Wilson would rather go, we ought not to keep him with us. Personally, I would rather he would stay with us."

Mr. William Brown said it was his impression that Mr. Wilson would not stay. While there was always a possibility of him changing his mind, it ought to be borne in mind that this was his second resignation, and if he were to stay again the likelihood was that it would be for a very short time only. Mr. Wilson felt that he was not accomplishing the results he ought to be getting and believed that some other man might succeed better. Mr. Brown did not agree with him. The church had never had so good a minister, and he was far from believing that Mr. Wilson's best work had been

done in London. There was a great deal more that he could do here. Chairman Doolittle agreed with Mr. Brown. Mr. Wilson had done grand work here, but there was a lot more for him to do yet before he was finally through. If, however, he really must go, then his most earnest wish was that God should be with him wherever he was. Chairman Doolittle then took a vote on whether the congregation would voice its opinion in favor of Mr. Wilson's staying by the sending of a deputation. The vote was carried unanimously.

Mr. Thomas Maitland was appointed to act as one of the deputation for the congregation. Mr. Maitland asked what the will of the congregation was in the matter, and if he was to refuse to countenance the acceptance of the resignation.

Mr. A. M. Scott spoke in favor of allowing Mr. Wilson to leave. "If he wants to go," said he, "let him go. I would like to have him stay, but I don't want to force him in the matter. I am not taking against Mr. Wilson; I am simply doing what I think to be my duty. If Mr. Wilson stays here, I am perfectly willing to work with him."

Mrs. Taylor expressed it as her opinion that the church would be a great sufferer if Mr. Wilson were to leave. They would perhaps feel the loss more among the young people than anywhere else. She thought Mr. Wilson ought to stay.

Mr. John Robinson was elected as the other representative of the congregation. In response to Mr. Connor's question, a vote was taken, and the verdict unanimously rendered was in favor of Mr. Wilson's staying in London.

Svingali, hypnotist and telepathist, opened a week's engagement before a crowded house at the London last night. He proved to be one of the best operators in his line ever seen in this city, introducing some original ideas and obtaining some mysterious results. The performance opened with an exhibition of telepathy by Svingali and Madame Svingali. The latter is thrown into a state of hypnosis and the former goes down into the audience, where he receives messages from any tests that their caprice suggests. Without a word being spoken by Prof. Svingali, who remained in the audience, Madame Svingali gave the answers to the questions proposed by the company. If the test required some act being performed on the stage, she did it, or if information was asked for, she wrote it out, and the answer was handed to the questioner for verification. He is a very rapid worker, and wastes no time in passing from one experiment to another. He made his subjects perform some very amusing antics, much to the enjoyment of the big audience. Between the first and second part of the programme, Miss Eleanor Bracer, a soloist of ability and charm, sang Cowen's song, "The Children's Hospital," for which she was heartily cheered.
