



## KING STREET CHURCH WANTS REV. THOS. WILSON TO STAY

to Oppose Acceptance of His Resignation.

A mass meeting of the congregation of the King Street Presbyterian Church was held last night in the school room to consider whether the resignation of their pastor, Rev. Mr. Wilson, would be accepted. Mr. C. L. Doolittle was in the chair.

of the session to go before the synod, was the first speaker. "If you do not appoint a deputation, the resignation will likely be accepted by default," said he. "The way I feel on the matter is that if Mr. Wilson would rather go, we ought not to keep him with us.

Personally, I would rather he would stay with us."

impression that Mr. Wilson would not stay. While there was always a pos-sibility of him changing his mind, it ought to be borne in mind that this was his second resignation, and if he were to stay again, the likelihood was that it would be for a very short time only. Mr. Wilson felt that he was not accomplishing the results he ought to be getting and believed that some other man might succeed better. Mr. Brown did not agree with him. The church had never had so good a minister, and he was far from believing in favor that Mr. Wilson's best work had been London.

Congregation Votes Unanimously done in London. There was a great deal more that he could do here. Chairman Doolittle agreed with Mr. Brown. Mr. Wilson had done grand work here, but there was a lot more for him to do yet before he was finally through. If, however, he really must go, then his most earnest wish was that God should be with him wherever he was. Chairman Doolittle then took a vote on whether the congregation would voice its opinion in favor of Mr. Wilson's staying by the sending of a deputation. The vote was carried unanimously.

Mr. Thomas Maitland was appointed to act as one of the deputation for the congregation. Mr. Maitland asked what the will of the congregation was in the matter, and if he was to refuse to countenance the acceptance of the resignation.

Mr. A. M. Scott spoke in favor of allowing Mr. Wilson to leave. "If he wants to go," said he, "let him go. would like to have him stay, but I don't want to force him in the matter. I am not talking against Mr. Wilson; I am simply doing what I think to be my duty. If Mr. Wilson stays here, I am perfectly willing to work with him. Mrs. Taylor expressed it as her opinion that the church would be a great sufferer if Mr. Wilson were to leave They would perhaps feel the loss more among the young people than anywhere else. She thought Mr. Wil-

son ought to stay. Mr. John Robinson was elected as the other representative of the con-gregation. In response to Mr. Conner's question, a vote was taken, and the verdict unanimously rendered was in favor of Mr. Wilson's staying in

# POSTPONED 'FOR REASONS'

Board of Trade Did Not Meet to Discuss Referendum.

Prominent Citizens Disappointed-President Hunt's Statement.

The meeting of the board of trade called for 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon to discuss the approaching referendum, failed to materialize. Early in the afternoon the press were notified that the meeting had been postponed, but this was, of course, too late to allow of the public learning of the fact before the hour set. The notices had been sent out by the secretary, at the order of the president, and the meeting had been well advertised and citizens had been invited. A deputation of the latter gathered at the rooms in expectation of the meeting going on, but the officers of the board were not there. Among those present were: Rev. Dr. Johnston, John Bowman, Edward Towe, D. W. Blackwell, D. A. Mc-Dermid, James Bowman, William Scarrow, C. B. Keenleyside, John Friend and others. Great dissatisfaction was expressed by these gentlemen over the action of the board, as they considered themselves the subjects of discourtesy, inasmuch as they had received no ir timation whatever of the postponement of the meeting.

Upon inquiry of Secretary Nelles, the reason for the sudden postponement. The Advertiser was told that it had been made for good reasons. For a further statement on the matter Mr. Nelles referred the questioner to Mr. C. B. Hunt, president of the board. Mr. Hunt at 11 o'clock handed out the following written statement:

"The meeting of the board of trade was postponed by request of several members of the board, who considered that the license act or referendum was not a proper subject for the board of trade to discuss, and also that the notice calling the meeting was irregu-

Mr. Hunt said he had no further statement to make in the matter.
