His Excellency Monsignor Sheahan, the apostolic delegate to Canada, accompanied by his secretary, Dr. Sianetti, arrived in this city from Ottawa via the C.P.R. at 11:35 this morning and was met at the depot by a party of local clergy. Among those who welcomed the distinguished visitor were His Lordship Bishop McEvey, Rev. Father O'Connell, Rev. Father O'Connell, Cathedral, Rev. Father McKoon, rector of St. Mary's Church; Rev. FRONTAGE TAX FOR SNOW CLEANING

Engineer Graydon Makes Another Suggestion—The Celebration of Christmas.

Natally, Mr. Graydon's scheme to charge the city for the snow removal in London, and have the sidewalks of a larger portion of the city properly cleaned, has been very popular. At his desk is covered with letters from citizens urging him to continue his fight against the old-fashioned snowing.

This is because the citizens are fearful of the work of snow shoveling, and the probability that they will be called upon to shovel their own man to clean off their walks. To overcome this probable difficulty, Mr. Graydon thinks that he might have a few men, and new wags, then be sent from the city hall to do the work.

As the district outlined by Mr. Graydon is a very large one, and it is to do people, the engineer thinks the frontage tax proposal would not meet with the approval of the taxpayers. But people would be assured of clean walks the entire winter.

This afternoon many of the prominent Catholic laymen of London visited the palace, and were presented to Monsignor Sharrett.

His Excellency, Most Reverend Donatus Sharratt, Archbishop of Ephesus, was born Nov. 12, 1856, at Monte Franco, diocese of Spoleto, in Italy. He was ordained a priest in 1874, and served as professor of philosophy in the University of the Propaganda, at the same time being secretary of the Propaganda for the United States and for American affairs.

When a student at the Apollinare Seminary his excellency was the principal figure in a disputation in philosophy, which was won by the triumph of the cardinals. Another student associated with him on the occasion was Mgr. Della Chisa, now

Lorenzetti now *papel nuncio* at Paris, who shared objections.

He 1890 appointed auditor of the apostolic delegation at Washington, D. C., aiding both Mgr. Satolli and Mgr. Martinielli. In 1890, at a critical juncture in the affairs of Cuba, he was dispatched to Havana, and rendered Gen. Wood valuable assistance in his reconstruction. He obtained the abolition of the Brooke law, which made marriage before the altar a crime, and secured the marriage in Cuba. He was Bishop of Havana for 20 months, and consolidated three antagonistic societies of Spaniards, who were at odds with the church, into one united order. The doctor was called in. Before either could arrive, however, the child was dead.

The parents, who are prostrated with grief, have the deepest sympathy of all their friends.
