Sicilian Earthquake as Measured by War

It has often been noted that the death toll of wars and battles, terrible as it is, falls below that of other scourges of the human race.

The terrible catastrophe of Sicily and Southern Italy provides another illustration. Today's estimate of the loss of life run from 50,000 upwards, one placing the figure as high as 200,000. Like the San Francisco and other similar disasters the earlier reports failed to measure the extent of the catastrophe, which seems to increase with every fresh message from the scene. A conservative estimate of the loss of life is 100,000 people, a figure which places it almost first in the world's record of disasters.

How appalling this loss is can be estimated better when it is recalled that the loss in life to the united British and Prussian armies at the battle of Waterloo was only 22,000 men; that bloody Gettysburg, the most disastrous battle of the American civil war, cost only 40,000 lives to both armies; that the battle of Mukden, in the barbaric Russo-Japanese war, took less than 30,000 Russians, and 17,000 Japanese; that the classic battle of Marathon took only 7,000 lives; that the total loss to all parties in the Boer war was scarcely over 25,000; and that the total British and French losses in the whole Crimean war were less than 90,-

A few seconds' quaking of the earth surpasses in its capacity for horror all the ingenuity of modern armies.
