BRITISH

At a Southampton inquest on a servant named Violet Simmonds, 13, it was stated she took poison. She said she wanted to die, as she had no pleasure like other people.

Horsham guardians accepted a tender on Wednesday for the supply of bread for the workhouse at 4½d per 4-pound loaf. The cheapest loaf to be obtained in the town retail is 6d.

Adolph Felsenthal, who fought in the British army during the Crimean war, was refused a vote at the Walthamstow revision court on Wednesday on the ground that he was an alien.

Skipper Newsome, of the Grimsby trawler Helvetia, who only a fortnight ago brought to port 73 sturgeon, landed 40 more royal fish. The largest specimen weighed fifteen stone, and the catch realised £55.

The Rev. J. Turner Smith, for seventeen years pastor of Argyle Congregational Church, Bath, whose wife died in 1894, has announced his approaching marriage with Miss Robinson, her sister.

Mr. Alfred Jeff, aged 81, of Sheffield, Beds., has been a relieving officer for 60 years without asking for a day's leave of absence, has not had a holiday since he was 21, and has never been laid up with illness.

At the Tower Bridge police court the magistrate awarded £1 to Thomas Burns, a ship's fireman, for saving a stevedore who had tried to drown himself in the river. This makes the eleventh life Burns has saved.

The local rate collector on Monday informed the council that whereas it formerly cost the parish £114 a year to have Hampton Court Palace on the rate-book, there is now a net profit to the rates of £139 per annum.

Only 69 days from the laying of the keel to the launching have been taken by Messrs. J. L. Thompson & Sons, Sunderland, shipbuilders, to build the steamer Blackwell, 7,500 tons. They claim to have established a record.

Charles Lund, boarding-house keeper, was charged at Middlesbrough on Wednesday with harboring and secreting five Swedish sailors who had deserted their ship. He was fined £30, and his "runner," named Olen, £4.

At Chester on Wednesday Richard Little was sent to jail for a month for stealing ferns on the Duke of Westminster's Eaton Hall estate. He was alleged to have threatened the men who stopped him, near Eaton woods, with a book.

"In our Sunday School Institute at Tollymore we allow card playing, but we take precautions against gambling," said the Rev. W. B. Ansley at the convention of Sunday School Unions, which was opened at Leicester last week.

Mr. George Whiteley, M. P., the chief Liberal whip, was ordered at the Brompton County court to pay £23 damages to a cab proprietor, whose cab and horse were injured in a collision with Mr. Whiteley's motor car in Leicester square.

Three Kettering lads, one of whom was only twelve and the other two fifteen, were ordered to a reformatory for having entered fourteen empty houses and one occupied house, and extracted money from the penny-in-the-slot gas meters.

Robert Griffiths, 68, an army pensioner, of Liverpool, proposed marriage to an elderly widow, and on receiving no definite reply hanged himself from a bedpost. It was the widow who found him dead. A verdict of "Suicide while insane" was returned.

Grazed by a passing motor car, a cow ran into a cottage at Smitham, near Purley, and went upstairs into a bedroom, where it broke some of the furniture. Eventually it charged out into the garden, carrying a hall clock before it. The total damage came to £50.

The judge at Southwark County court on Monday said: "I do not like to see one firm taking an action against another over a couple of sovereigns. It has taken two counsel, two solicitors, and seven witnesses to present this case, in which the stake is so small."

Built in the reign of Queen Anne, Orleans House, Twickenham, for many years the home of the Dukes of Orleans, was withdrawn from sale at the Mart on Monday owing to the auctioneer refusing to accept less than £19,000. The highest bid was £18,500.

At Yarmouth on Wednesday the last surviving local windmill, which dated from 1796, was sold under the hammer for demolition, and the structure, with sails and stones, realized £27. At one time Yarmouth resembled a Dutch town from its number of windmills.

Seeing an old man named Daniel Bottom, deaf and nearly blind, jump into the Medway on Monday at Rochester, a Royal Marine at once leapt from a cab, in which he was

passing, and plunged into the river. He got Bottom out, but the old man was dead.

At Llandaff Diocesan Conference on Wednesday the Rev. Jesse Jones gave instances of several colliers, as well as a blacksmith and draper's assistant, from his parish who had entered the church. One collier had become a vicar in Llandaff Diocese, and another was vicar of an important parish of Durham.

The destroyer Flirt, belonging to the Portsmouth Reserve Flotilla, after being laid up for repairs for three months, on Wednesday went out for her steam trial. On returning to Portsmouth she ran into the wall of the dockyard jetty. It will take three or four weeks to repair the damage to her bows.

Mr. Victor Grayson, M. P. for Colne Valley, is in danger of his seat, owing to an election declaration being handed in to the returning officer on a fortnight late. It is this ruled a breach of the corrupt practices act of the liability of Mr. Grayson would be £2,200, seeing that he voted on 22 occasions in the last session of Parliament.

The great seal of the late South African Republic was sold by auction by Knight, Frank & Rutley, in Conduit street, on Oct. 18. This relic is formed of a circular steel matrix, engraved in the center with the arms and motto of the republic, surrounded by the inscription, "Gouvernement Zuid Afrikaansche Republiek."

The Postmaster-General, Mr. Sydney Buxton, speaking at Glasgow on Wednesday, said he found a cat attached to the central telegraph office, which had been drawing eightpence a week from the public purse for feeding. The Government was pledged to economy, so, though they had not cut off the eightpence at once, they had reduced it very substantially.

Mrs. Rollason, of Leamington, was at Warwick awarded £1,825 damages against the Great Eastern Railway Company for the loss of her husband and her eldest son, J. F. Robinson, a jockey, both of whom perished in the wreck of the Berlin at the Hook of Holland. The jockey's engagement with a Dutch sportsman, it was also stated, was worth £1,000 a year.

Hop packing in many of the Kentish grounds has practically come to an end for the season.

Believed to be the oldest inhabitant of Cheltenham, Mrs. Bricknell has just died at the age of 101.

Salisbury's new dean, in place of the late Dr. Webb, is the Rev. W. P. Roberts, canon of Canterbury.

The King was amongst those who sent telegrams of congratulation to Sir Theodore Martin, who has celebrated the 51st anniversary of his birthday.

Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Gwynn have just celebrated their diamond wedding at Catshill, Worcestershire. Mr. Gwynn has been a chorister for 70 years.

Damage estimated at £20,000 was done by a collision between the Cardiff steamer Duffryn Manor and the London steamer Archon in the Bristol Channel.

Over 12,000 weddings have been attended, and 1,200 brides given away by Mr. E. J. Lupton, parish clerk of Yarmouth, who has completed 44 years' service.

Described as the oldest living couple in Derbyshire, Mr. and Mrs. Preston, of North Wingfield, near Chesterfield, have just completed 60 years of married life.

There was a net rise in workmen's wages during August of £48,200 weekly, mainly accounted for by advances to coal miners, says a board of trade return.

Both candidates for the parliamentary representation of the Kirkdale division of Liverpool have declared themselves in favor of women's suffrage.

A compound fracture of the leg was inflicted on a plate-layer named Hall, while working on the railway at Eastville, Lincs., by a piece of coal which fell from a passing engine.

The body of a man found floating in the sea off Brighton on Saturday was identified as that of Mr. George Bridgland, recently a glass and china merchant at East Grinstead.

The King has conferred the Albert medal of the second class upon Mr. Frank Hughes for gallantry in saving life at a flooded mine at Bonnievale, Western Australia, in March last.

London's death rate in the four weeks ended last Saturday averaged 11.8 per 1,000, being 4.5 per 1,000 below the mean rate in the corresponding periods of the five years 1902-6.

As the result of a conference at Skibo Castle of Lord Weardale and Sir Randall Cremer, M. P., with Mr. Andrew Carnegie, the formation of a powerful Anglo-American committee of the Inter-Parliamentary Union is expected.

POPE AGAINST MIXED MARRIAGES

Finds That Princes Have Failed to Keep Promises to the Church.

London, Oct. 20.—The noble Roman lady whose intention to marry an ex-carabinieri caused a sensation in Roman society is the Marchesa Maria Soruppi-Sacchetti, and the name of the happy man is Scalfaro. The wedding has already taken place.

Not having succeeded in dissuading the Marchesa Sacchetti from her proposal to wed the ex-police officer, the Pope authorized religious celebration of the marriage. This took place at Anzio, a seaport near Rome, on Saturday, the civil ceremony subsequently being gone through on the Capitol Hill in Rome.

Scalfaro is a Calabrian, born at Reggio, thirty-five years ago. He is said to be able to show that his ancestors in remote ages held baronial property, the title of which he intends resuming for the sake of his wife.

Another complicated matrimonial affair is occupying the attention of the papal court. It concerns Prince George of Greece's marriage with the Princess Maria Bonaparte, the former belongs to the Greek Church, and the latter to the Roman communion.

Pius X. has taken a strong line against the policy of compromise in the matter of divorce, which, under the less ill-sounding name of annulment, were fairly easily obtainable from the Roman Curia during previous pontificates in cases where money was no object, and he has shown redoubled severity towards the question of mixed marriages. So seriously is this case that by a recent papal decree various unions hitherto tolerated under certain conditions will, when contracted after next Easter, be regarded by the Roman Church as null and void.

The two biggest mixed marriage scandals of recent years were those of Prince Waldemar of Denmark and Prince Ferdinand of Bulgaria, both of whom have notoriously violated the pledges given to the Holy See, particularly as regards the forbidding of their offspring from the Catholic faith. These and similar reasons are urging his holiness to attempt to exact a formal written and sworn pledge enforced by legal guarantees from the Greek prince as a condition of the papal consent to his marriage with the Princess Maria Bonaparte.

LEAKAGE IN WIRELESS
French Authorities Uneasy Over Fact That Messages Are Intercepted.

Paris, Oct. 21.—The French Ministry of War has received striking proof of the possibility of intercepting "wireless" messages.

Communication has been maintained by "wireless" between a Government station on the Eiffel Tower and Casablanca. The War Office has carefully kept the text of these messages secret.

Yesterday topics of all messages thus exchanged by the War Office and General Druce at Casablanca were received from Verdun, a military station near the German frontier.

It appears that, although the messages passed between the Eiffel Tower and Casablanca without difficulty, they were recorded at the Government wireless station at Verdun. The fact that official messages can thus be intercepted during a campaign has given the military authorities much uneasiness.

Advertiser Correspondence
The Farmer on the Market.
To the Editor of The Advertiser:—Frequently there is published, under glaring headlines, strong condemnation of farmers attending the market for sharp tricks.

Who sets the example? Take the way farmers are beat all around by city folks, and is it any wonder that the farmer, in the market, is measured back? Bakers' loaves have been getting smaller and smaller until they are not much more than a large bun, and almost always from 10 to 15 per cent short weight.

Farmers buy large quantities of bread. Then we buy tea or other groceries. A big heavy wrapping paper or bag is put on the scale and weighed in as goods, and we pay for 10 cents to 50 cents of anywhere from 10 cents to 50 cents of a pound. Pretty good profit. Again, the farmer is charged the same price as city customers, and takes the goods away from the store, helping to pay for the up-keep of delivery rigs, etc., without deriving any benefit.

Many farmers have to buy fruit in the city, and they notice that fruit boxes and baskets are passing through the "shrinking" process. Is it any wonder potato bags follow the same rule?

When the farmer has anything to sell the city customer does his best to sell him down in price or beat him in weight. Wool the same. If the farmer has a little larger than usual the city buyer keeps of from five to ten pounds prices.

When selling hides, for instance, the buyer keeps of from five to ten pounds weight. Wool the same. If the farmer has a little larger than usual the city buyer keeps of from five to ten pounds prices.

To deal regularly on the market would mean that farmers or anyone else feel if justified in adopting some method of getting even with those they rub up against.

Let the city people use farmers "on the square," and they will find themselves just as honest as the city people are, and, perhaps, a little more so.

But just as long as the fight continues along present lines, city people may expect to get some doses of their own medicine.
