"This is due largely to the vigor lecture throughout by frequent ap-plause, and a heartily vote of thanks more noticeable than ever this year. During the year 279 males and 9 females were charged with being disorderly as against 315 males and 7 females in 1908.

Assaults showed a very noticeable decrease, there being only 57 males and 5 females in 1909, as compared with 79 males and 5 females in 1908. During the year the court received \$205 from citizens who rode bicycles as against \$257 in 1908.

The Liquor Laws. In 1909, 45 males and 1 female ap-

peared for breaches of the liquor laws by selling without a license, as against 43 males in 1908. One hundred and eleven members of the Indian list brigade appeared in 1908, and only 74 last year. This is one of the most noticeable decreases, and at the same time most important, as it indicates that a number of undesirables have either left the city or are keeping away from hotels.
